According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

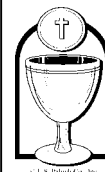
**If you are hospitalized...**

Please call Fr. Slawek at 630-773-1272 (ext. 208) to make arrangements.

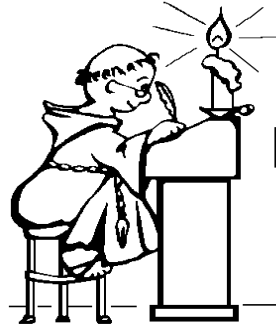

## From the Pastor

Especially during this diocesan year of the Eucharist, it is particularly fitting for us to examine our relationship with the Holy Mass, where Jesus is given to us in Holy Communion: body, blood, soul and divinity. What is important about the Holy Mass, in not whether the homily or music is good or how it makes us feel. What is important is Jesus, in His humility, chose to give us Himself in an unbloody sacrifice each and every day in the Eucharist. Prayerfully consider that every day of the year there is the opportunity to not only meet Jesus Christ but receive Him into ourselves. It is a very big deal when we choose not to go to Sunday Mass as we are refusing to honor God and receive the gift of the Lord, Himself.

However, coming to the Mass is not enough. We need to bring an open heart which understands the importance and the need to be on time, to participate fully in the entire Mass. It is during the penitential rite (where we say "I confess...") that we are freed from all our venial sins (mortal sins must be confessed in reconciliation), so when we receive Jesus, in Holy Communion, we do so with a clean heart. Those venial sins which we bring to mind are completely wiped out. When we receive Jesus, He is able to transform us into His likeness through our more worthy reception.

We stay until the final blessing because it is God, Himself, who blesses us through His representative, the priest. Jesus Christ as first priest of the Father hands down the blessing of the Father to us all. This blessing sustains us throughout the week to go, love and work in the name of the Lord.

Please continue to help others, as we help ourselves, to prayerfully grow in love and devotion to the center of our Catholic faith--the Holy Mass.

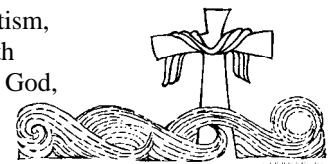



## Living Liturgy 2010

### LITURGY AS PRAYER:

We call liturgy a celebration, a ritual act, the communal worship of the people. We process during liturgy, sing, acclaim, proclaim. Liturgy is filled with many different kinds of activities. This Sunday's Gospel challenges us to consider whether we approach liturgy as *prayer*. True, we pray the Our Father just before Communion, the prayer that Jesus taught us and we hear about in this Sunday's Gospel. Since this is the prayer that Jesus taught, we rightly think of its preeminence. At the same time we cannot forget that *all* of liturgy is prayer, from the beginning sign of the cross to the concluding blessing. A prayerful attitude should mark how we celebrate liturgy.



Why is it important to insist that liturgy is prayer? An attitude of prayer keeps us focused on the relationship we share with God. It helps us realize that we celebrate liturgy not because of any power we have but because God invites us and gives us the Spirit who enables us to respond with praise and thanksgiving.

True, different kinds of prayer mark our liturgies. Sometimes we pray aloud together, such as during the responsorial psalm and the Our Father. Sometimes we are given silent time to very personally pour out our hearts to God in prayer, such as in the quiet time after the readings and after Communion. Sometimes we actively listen as another voice our prayer, such as during the presidential prayers (opening prayer, prayer of the gifts, prayer after Communion) and the Eucharistic prayer. Surely our acclaiming and hymn singing is also prayer. But for all these (and other) types of prayer during Mass, the real challenge is to make the *whole Mass* the one prayer of the one Body of Christ.

## Jesus waits for us in this Sacrament of Love

*"In the sacred Host, He is present, the true treasure, always waiting for us. Only by adoring this Presence do we learn how to receive Him properly."*

### WHAT IS EUCHARISTIC ADORATION?

Understood simply, Eucharistic Adoration is adoring or honoring the Eucharistic Presence of Christ. In a deeper sense, it involves "the contemplation of the Mystery of Christ truly present before us."

During Eucharistic Adoration, we "watch and wait," we remain "silent" in His Presence and open ourselves to His Graces which flow from the Eucharist... By worshipping the Eucharistic Jesus, and we become what God wants us to be!

Like a magnet, The Lord draws us to Himself and gently transforms us.

In its fullest essence... Eucharistic Adoration is "God and Man reaching out for each other, at the same time!"

### The Eucharist is: Jesus truly present — Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity!

At the moment of Consecration, during the Mass, the "gifts" of bread and wine are transformed (transubstantiated) into the actual Body and Blood of Christ, at the Altar. This means that they are not only spiritually transformed, but rather are actually (substantially) transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. The elements retain the appearance of bread and wine, but are indeed the actual Body and Blood of Christ. This is what is meant by Real Presence: the actual, physical presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

Christ instituted this Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist in order to remain with mankind until the end of time (Jn. 14:18).

### The (reserved) Blessed Sacrament serves as a focal point of devotion.

Because, as Catholics, we believe that Christ is truly and substantially present in the Eucharist, the Blessed Sacrament is given the same adoration and devotion that is accorded to Christ.

At the beginning of the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, a priest or deacon removes the sacred host from the tabernacle and places it in the Monstrance on the Altar for adoration by the faithful. "Monstrance" is the vessel used in the Church to display the consecrated Eucharistic Host, during Eucharistic adoration or benediction. The word monstrance comes from the Latin word *monstrare*, meaning "to expose." It is known in Latin as an *Ostensorium*. When a consecrated host is placed in the monstrance, it is said to be a solemn exposition.

When the Monstrance contains the Sacred Host, the priest does not touch it with his bare hands, but instead, holds it with a *humeral veil*, a wide band of cloth that covers his shoulders (humeri) and has pleats on the inside in which he places his hands.

At all other times, the reserved Sacrament is kept locked in the Tabernacle, so that the faithful may pray in the presence of the Sacrament.

"Perpetual Adoration" is Eucharistic Adoration round the clock (that is, twenty-four hours a day). A "Holy Hour" is "Eucharistic Adoration of Reparation" which lasts for about an hour.

Adoration ceremonies traditionally include Scripture readings, hymns, prayers and time for silent adoration.

Candidates are individuals who have been baptized in any Christian church (including Roman Catholics) but have not been confirmed in the Catholic Church and Inquirers are those who want to know more about the Roman Catholic Church.
