From the **Pastor**

Dear Parish Family,

Traditionally, on the Fifth Sunday of Lent, we enter what was called **Passiontide**. The penance and discipline of Lent change focus a bit. The prayers and readings of the Mass now focus our attention on the passion, death, and Resurrection of Jesus — The Paschal Mystery — and the events leading up to this central mystery and belief of our faith as Catholic Christians.

More and more the Lenten purple is replaced by the red of the Passion: A reminder of the Blood of Jesus. A red veil is placed on the crucifix (or cross) to remind us that the true meaning, the real beauty of the Cross is (for a time) hidden or veiled from our eyes. The Glory of the Cross is stained and covered by the Blood of Christ's suffering. The practice of veiling the cross goes back many centuries and is meant to make us take a second look, it is meant to get us thinking, it is meant to let us know that something is profoundly different. The statues of saints also remain covered until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday. All this is done to help us concentrate on the great essentials of Christ's work of redemption through the shedding of His Blood.

Our Lenten journey of repentance brings us to the story of the woman caught in adultery. An intense scene is before us today [Gospel of John 8:1-11]. It relates one of the most striking portrayals of Jesus' mercy. We have the woman, the crowd with the Scribes and the Pharisees, and Jesus. The challenge to have Jesus make a verdict is before him. What follows is a dramatic silence. Jesus does not do a thing but scribble on the ground which may indicate his lack of interest. He does not say a word. He lets the situation speak for itself.

The woman is frightened and humiliated. She feels shame and is unprepared for a gruesome and painful death. A death by stoning.

The crowd was in full righteous, but hypocritical, agitation. Yet, one can see that the attack was not so much against the woman as it was toward Jesus. The scribes and the Pharisees wanted to prove that Jesus' words of compassion conflicted with the Law of Moses. So, they set up this situation to discredit Jesus so they could judge and kill him. The last thing they had on their minds and the last thing they expected was to be questioned about the morality of their own lives. Jesus knew their plan. So, he said, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." They were stunned and soon all of them walked away. The Lord does not condemn her. Instead, he asks her to go and sin no more.

Like the crowd, we can easily become indignant by the sins of others. Like the crowd, we can easily use the sin of others to hide our own sins. Like the crowd, we can arrogantly use others to draw attention away from ourselves. We each know our sins and Lent offers us repentance and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. This great sacrament is a celebration of forgiveness of our sins. Within it we are told, like the woman,


to amend our lives and go and sin no more. No matter the sin.

Let us resolve to receive this great gift of God's mercy and forgiveness and thus ready ourselves for the celebration of the Paschal Mystery and the new light and life of Jesus Christ this Easter.

Let us all examine our own hearts before self-righteously judging others.



The Veiling of Images and Crosses

from the USCCB Committee on Divine Worship

Does the new Missale Romanum allow for the veiling of statues and crosses? The Missale Romanum, editio typica tertia, provides a rubric at the beginning of the texts for the Fifth Sunday of Lent, which allows that: "the practice of covering crosses and images in the Church from the Fifth Sunday of Lent is permitted, according to the judgment of the Conferences of Bishops. Crosses remain veiled until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday; images remain veiled until the beginning of the Easter Vigil."1

Have the Bishops of the Unites States expressed the judgment on this practice? Yes. On June 14, 2001, the Latin Church members of the USCCB approved an adaptation to number 318 of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal which would allow for the veiling of crosses and images in this manner. On April 17, 2002, Cardinal Jorge Medina Estevez, Prefect of the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments wrote to Bishop Wilton D. Gregory, USCCB President (Prot. no. 1381/01/L), noting that this matter belonged more properly to the rubrics of the Fifth Sunday of Lent. While the decision of the USCCB will be included with this rubric when the Roman Missal is eventually published, the veiling of crosses and images may now take place at the discretion of the local pastor.

When may crosses and images be veiled?

Crosses and images may be veiled on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Crosses are unveiled following the Good Friday Liturgy, while images are unveiled before the beginning of the Easter Vigil.

Is the veiling of crosses and statues required?

No. The veiling is offered as an option, at the discretion of the local pastor.


What is the reason for the veiling of crosses and images? The veiling of crosses and images is a sort of "fasting" from sacred depictions which represent the paschal glory of our salvation. Just as the Lenten fast concludes with the Paschal feast, so too, our fasting from the cross culminates in an adoration of the holy wood on which the sacrifice of Calvary was offered for our sins. Likewise, a fasting from the glorious images of the mysteries of faith and the saints in glory, culminates on the Easter night with a renewed appreciation of the glorious victory won by Christ, risen from the tomb to win for us eternal life.

Why are crosses unveiled after the Good Friday Liturgy? An important part of the Good Friday Liturgy is the veneration of the cross, which may include its unveiling. Once the cross to be venerated has been unveiled, it seems logical that all crosses would remain unveiled for the veneration of the faithful.

What do the veils look like? While liturgical law does not prescribe the form or color of such veils, they have traditionally been made of simple, lightweight purple cloth, without ornament.

Is it permissible to veil the crosses after the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday? Yes. The concluding rubrics which follow the text for the Mass of the Lord's Supper (no. 41) indicate that "at an opportune time the altar is stripped and, if it is possible, crosses are removed from the church. It is fitting that crosses which remain in the Church be veiled."²






Is God Calling Me To Be A Priest? How Do I Know If God Is Calling Me?

- Prayer. Spend time daily in quiet prayer, especially in the presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Also pray the rosary. Mary's total surrender to God is a model for all of us to follow. Read the Scriptures, especially the Gospels.
- Sacraments. Frequent reception of the sacraments of penance and the Eucharist open our hearts to hearing the voice of God.
- Counsel. Seek counsel from people you trust (your parents, a priest). Get spiritual direction from someone trained to do so.
- Silence. Being with God in silence allows us to hear His voice, away from all of the distractions of the world.
- Visit. Visit a seminary. You do not know what you are saying yes or no to unless you go and see.
- Participate. Join a discernment group in order to be with others who are trying to discern God's will in their lives.
- Trust. Above all, trust that doing the will of God will bring us joy and peace.

If you are thinking about priesthood, please consider taking part in some of the events offer in the Diocese of Joliet. You are not alone in this search to do God's will.



Bulletin submissions are to be submitted **no later than 8 days preceding** requested publication date. Notices and full page flyers will run for a maximum of two weeks, and priority will be given to items that are date sensitive. Adults interested in becoming Catholic or learning about the Catholic faith should contact the Parish Center for information.

BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.

Additionally, before being admitted to a hospital for surgery, it is advisable to call Fr. Noesen to arrange to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Please contact the Parish Center at 630-773-1272 (ext. 200) to arrange for communion visits to the homebound.

FUNERALS

It is the responsibility of the parish to bury their dead. The funeral director will contact the Parish Center regarding arrangements. Funerals are ordinarily celebrated at 10:00 am. For more information, please read guidelines for Funeral Planning on the parish website.



If it is too difficult for you to walk to the front of the church to receive Communion, please know that at each Mass an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion comes to the back of the church to distribute Communion. If you would like to have the Extraordinary Minister give you communion in the back of church, please let an usher know

before Mass begins. At Communion time, when you see the Extraordinary Minister come to the back, please raise your hand so that they can see you and give you Holy Communion.


