# From the Pastor

#### Dear Parish family,

In today's readings, we hear about people being chosen by God to fulfill a certain task. They all chose to respond to God's call. In the Gospel, Jesus summons the Twelve Apostles to go out and do as the Spirit of God will lead them to do. He sends the Apostles on a mission of evangelization, a mission that we continue today.

We Catholics cannot avoid the demand of evangelization, of proclaiming the faith. The Church is that vehicle that God uses to evangelize. This is Her mission. Bringing people to Christ is not one work among many; rather, it is the central work of the Church around which everything else we do revolves.

Do we need evangelization? The statistics couldn't be clearer. Bishop Robert Barron of Los Angeles once wrote on this. He said "Did you know that the fastest-growing 'religious' group in the United States is the 'nones'—that is, those who claim no religious affiliation? In the latest Pew Research Center survey, fully 25 percent of the country—80 million people—say that they have no formal religion. When we focus on young people, the picture is even bleaker. Almost 40 percent of those under thirty are 'nones', and among Catholics in that age group, the number rises to 50 percent. Of all the Catholic children baptized or confirmed these last thirty years, half no longer participate in the life of the Church."

So, knowing these numbers, we need evangelization more than ever before. Like the Apostles who went out before anyone else, we know, that if we go out and evangelize... many may find amazement and thus be drawn to Jesus Christ and the Catholic Faith; however, many more may reject us... like the Apostles were rejected.

Friends, in today's Gospel, besides giving instructions on what to do, Jesus gave His Apostles authority – the power of the Holy Spirit. That Holy Spirit gave them the words to preach, the power to heal and cure, all done in Christ's name. We also know that if they found persecution, which they did, Jesus assured that the Holy Spirit would help in times of maltreatment. Rest assured, if we are sent by God, the Holy Spirit will be our support, advocate, and encouragement.

The Holy Spirit is the Divine friend of all who do the work of Jesus the Christ within His Church. The Holy Spirit is the advocate who will inspire Christians up and down the ages.

When the Apostles and martyrs went to their deaths, it was with the help of the Holy Spirit; when the missionaries of all the centuries went to proclaim the faith in hostile lands, it was the Holy Spirit who pleaded on their behalf; and, when a Saint such as Edith Stein went with her Gestapo captors to Auschwitz, she did so with the Holy Spirit. That same Spirit is with you today, right now. So let us not be afraid. For our world is still in desperate need of prophets and apostles. Perhaps today's Word of God will inspire us to respond to God's call to bring the gospel of salvation to those we meet in our everyday lives. Do not be afraid.

## **Raising Young Kids in the Faith**



"Don't isolate your children from the world out of fear.

Teach them to be the salt and light of the world,

not to escape the world."

- > Start sharing the faith with your kids early. Don't wait until you see red flags to share Christ with them. Christ should not be an emergency room doctor in the lives of your children.
- > Be a witness. Make sure you model holiness to your children, and also talk about the faith at home regularly.
- > Expose your children to a wide variety to Catholic traditions and spiritualties. Don't impose your own spirituality on your children; allow them to build their own unique relationship with Christ.
- > Do not reduce Catholic teachings to just morality or rules.
- > Explain the meaning behind all the things we do in regards to the Catholic faith.
- > Foster a good grasp of the Kerygma. Try to incorporate the Gospel in family prayer.
- > Teach your children to navigate the world by holding onto the good in the world and avoiding the evil in the world. Don't isolate your children from the world out of fear, teach them to bring the salt and light of Christ into the world, not to escape the world. Remind them that the world is worth living for and teach them to discern between good and evil in the world.
- > Implement natural discipline into their lives, discipline is needed in order to follow Christ.
- Stop trying to meet every need and desire of your child. Don't try to keep them constantly entertained and busy. The Christian life is a fully human life; teach your children how to deal with being alone and how to deal with boredom.

# The 'cancel culture' From a Perspective of Faith

A poll released by the Cato Institute toward the end of July found that 62% of Americans have political views that they are afraid to share because others might find them offensive. That's nearly two thirds of our population that is living in fear of what might happen if they were to speak openly with others about what they believe. For a society that professes to value tolerance to the point of making it the greatest of all goods, something, as the Bard might say, is rotten in the state — and soul — of our nation.

Of course, Catholics know a thing or two about being in the "cancel column." Being simultaneously in favor of life and monogamous male-female marriage and against artificial contraception and reproductive technology doesn't play well in today's culture. At nearly every turn, Catholics are said to be bigoted, out of step, ignorant or simply of another time. And rightly or wrongly, we are all too used to staying quiet — or worse, to being pressured into the acceptable opinions of the day.

Now, as the country confronts another wave of racial strife, Catholic figures such as St. Junipero Serra, Flannery O'Connor and St. Damien of Molokai are in the crosshairs of cancel culture. Concurrently, and for unknown reasons, statues of the Blessed Mother and Christ himself are being vandalized, and churches are being targeted.


Despite these challenges, the mission of our Faith stands firm. We are called to preach the Gospel, no matter where it might lead, as so many martyrs have shown us over the course of history. This is our mission, our raison d'etre, and how we will, with the grace of God, forge our path to heaven.

This is, importantly, the real reason for freedom of speech. Far from being a divine right handed down by God, it has for Christians a single purpose: to speak the truth and to share that truth with the world. Calumny is not the purpose of free speech, and respect for the dignity of the human person must be central to any dialogue. This is critical enough when encountering secular culture, but especially true when the dialogue is among members of our own faith. If Christians know what it means to be canceled, why do we seem so keen on canceling each other? The toxicity spewed by many in the Church — especially on social media and on certain websites — is both shocking and devastating. It's one thing to be canceled by the "world"; it is another altogether to be dismissed by those who profess to share the same faith — a faith that professes to uphold both charity and the dignity of others at its very core.

At the same time, our cancel culture is slowly eroding the ability to grow and develop as a human being. If we are reluctant to share our opinions with others, we are less able to wrestle with complex issues, to form our consciences, or to change. And we are unable to help others to do the same. The Church encourages us to learn and to think, with the ultimate goal of coming to the truth, as our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ taught us. And while no amount of canceling can change that, without the ability freely to converse without running into the threat of a Twitter mob, our job of evangelization is made all the more difficult.

Despite its trendiness, "canceling" isn't a phenomenon particular to this year or even this era. Recall how 2,000 years ago a mob clamored for the crucifixion of a man they considered a danger because of his radical call to love. In the last year, reported Open Doors USA, more than 260 million of his followers have been living in parts of the world that experience high levels of persecution, and nearly 3,000 were killed for their beliefs. The cancelation of Jesus Christ, though, bore fruit in a faith that continues to proclaim his words, his example and his very self as the way, the truth and the life. As we navigate the challenges of our cancel culture, may that thought be a comfort to us all.







The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information. Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

#### WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

# HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS


