BAPTISMS

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office **no** later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

If it is too difficult for you to walk to the front of the church to receive Communion, please know that at each Mass an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion comes to the back of the church to distribute Communion. If you would like to have the Extraordinary Minister give you communion in the back of church, please let an usher know before

Mass begins. At Communion time, when you see the Extraordinary Minister come to the back, please raise your hand so that they can see you and give you Holy Communion. It has been two weeks since I've returned from my mission trip to Kenya and Uganda. I would like to thank all of you for your prayers and support.

The first words that I can use to describe my experience there was **SIMPLICITY OF LIFE**. For those two weeks, I basically lived the life of the religious brothers of the M.O.P, Missionaries of the Poor. In Chokaa, outside of Nairobi, Kenya, there are 17 brothers. They live in very small rooms, the size of our ushers' room, with usually four brothers sharing two bunk beds, with no closets. They own very few personal items.

From the **Pastor**

The day starts at 5:45 a.m., with the awaking chimes by the bell ringer. Mass starts at

6:15 every day, combined with morning prayer, followed by Eucharistic Exposition and adoration. Music fills every prayerful time together. They have drums, tambourines, a keyboard and guitars leading into song throughout the Mass and morning prayer, making this time even more special. Then at 8:00 am, breakfast is served, and all eat together in the dining room, where they

share their spiritual reflections on the readings.

After breakfast, each brother is assigned to different tasks. Some help run the school that the M.O.P. created for children, ages 4 to 6, of the poorest families, usually a single-parent family. The Divine Mercy Academy provides breakfast, lunch, and a light dinner at the end of the school day to all of its students, which is the last meal that many of these children will have for the day. The M.O.P. provides the children with uniforms, shoes and even socks, so all have adequate clothing to attend school. At present, there are 120 beautiful and extremely friendly children in attendance, though the waiting list is more than double that number.

Other brothers help run the orphanage that the M.O.P. created three years ago, which takes care of approximately 60 special needs children who have no family. Many of them have such disabilities including autism, Down's Syndrome, cerebral palsy and other physical and developmental disabilities. The brothers and staff work tirelessly to cook, feed, care for the children and clean the facilities. Specifically, I was impressed with their washing of bed sheets every day by hand to maintain a clean and healthy environment for the children. Again, what also struck me was these children's outgoing nature and friendliness towards me, a stranger.

Other brothers help plant and maintain the crops they have in their sizeable garden to aid in their becoming a selfsustaining community. In addition to many fruits and vegetables, they also raise chickens, geese, turkeys and goats.

They take a break for noon prayer, which again includes song, and then they have lunch. Returning to their duties, they end their work day with evening prayer at 5:00 pm, with dinner following shortly after. After a rest, they close their day singing the night prayer.

I then was able to visit the M.O.P. Provincial House in neighboring Kampala, Uganda. There, because it is a house of formation, there were approximately 80 brothers in different levels of formation living a cloistered life. They also do much of the same work as the brothers in Kenya, though on a larger scale. There are two orphanage centers there -- one for 180 boys and one for 220 girls. Obviously, much more work is needed there, but I was impressed with how clean they were able to maintain their facilities throughout.

The superior in Uganda, Fr. Allan, is a bit more advanced in engineering and tries to make the M.O.P. as selfsustaining as possible. He started an aquaponics pond where he is raising over 1,000 tilapia every year. They have more land, so more animals are raised there, including pigs and rabbits. Their farm included banana trees, papaya trees and jack fruit trees - something new I had never tried before, but very sweet and delicious, along with much more.

In Uganda, the Missionaries provide clean water free of charge for the entire village, because the government does not. The M.O.P. in all of its locations runs itself with no government funding, only donations.

In summary, our donations helped to provide three meals for many, both typical and special needs children. I was able to help them purchase cleaning supplies and equipment that they couldn't afford before, as well as new mattresses that needed to be replaced, as well as other numerous items.

The brothers are most grateful for your support, both in prayer and financial, so they can continue to serve the poorest of the poor, to help them have a better life. You can visit Missionariesofthepoor.org for more information.

FORMING CONSCIENCES FOR FAITHFUL CITIZENSHIP INTRODUCTORY NOTE

Catholics Care.

Catholics Vote.

"We need to participate for the common good. Sometimes we hear: a good Catholic is not interested in politics. This is not true: good Catholics immerse themselves in politics by offering the best of themselves so that the leader can govern." Pope Francis, 9/16/13

The Catholic bishops of the United States are pleased to offer once again to the Catholic faithful *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, our teaching document on the political responsibility of Catholics. This statement represents our guidance for Catholics in the exercise of their rights and duties as participants in our democracy. We urge our pastors, lay and religious faithful, and all people of good will to use this statement to help form their consciences; to teach those entrusted to their care; to contribute to civil and respectful public dialogue; and to shape political choices in the coming election in light of Catholic teaching. The statement lifts up our dual heritage as both faithful Catholics and American citizens with rights and duties as participants in the civil order.

In this document, the bishops do not tell Catholics for whom or against whom to vote. Their purpose is to help Catholics form their consciences in accordance with God's truth. They recognize that the responsibility to make choices in political life rests with each individual in light of a properly formed conscience. In addition to reflecting on Catholic teaching and political life and summarizing their policy positions on major issues, the United States Catholic bishops also call all of us to prayer. They state that the "struggles that we face as a nation and as a global community cannot be addressed solely by choosing the "best candidate" for political office." We need to "ask humbly in prayer for an outpouring of the grace of the Holy Spirit on the United States of America."
