#### BAPTISMS

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office **no** later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the **baptism planning information** provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by **each godparent**. The proper **sponsor certificate** for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

# From the **Pastor**

We also began Ordinary Time this past Tuesday. To conclude Christmastide, the Church gave us the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord on Monday to reflect on the miracle of our Savior being born on earth and our response to such glad tidings. God loved us so much he came down from heaven and was born as an innocent baby. What is our response to that love? Have we already forgotten the baby Jesus in the manger? How can our reflection of God in the baby Jesus help us to grow more loving and kind?

One of the hardest things for us to do is to not judge others. It is also one of the two things God has reserved for himself—judgment and revenge. We can be assured that God's judgment and revenge will be just, as God is Love and sees all things. He sees the circumstances, the intent, the person's heart, etc. We, on the other hand, only see a part of a situation and through the distorted lens of original sin.

Telling the truth is not a sin, but the way we tell that truth can be. Are we telling the truth in anger or pride (I am so good and you are not). This can be especially evident during the celebration of the holy mass. There is no doubt that there are distractions at mass that can annoy us. Maybe someone is chatting, children are misbehaving, the reading can't be heard, or a multitude of other distractions; but, how are we letting those distractions affect us? Where is our heart when we are coming up for Holy Communion? Is it full of anger toward the chatting adults or the parents of the misbehaving children? Do we have the forgiveness in our hearts that Jesus requires of us when he said in Matthew 5:22 & 24, "But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment... leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother." We are not receiving the Holy Eucharist worthily if we are angry and upset with others.

I am not bringing this up to upset anyone. I only want us to love each other more and in the way Christ would want us too. I am not trying to condone bad behavior or say not to offer a fraternal correction. What I am saying is to look at the motive, the way it is done, if it is really necessary or simply requires a mortification on your part. On the other hand, I am also asking the people who are chatting during mass, or the parents of the children who are struggling more than usual to consider those who are around them prayerfully trying to participate in the Holy Mass. Is your conversation absolutely necessary and should you possible take the struggling child to the back of the church to settle him or her down?

We all need to appreciate and be considerate of each other. We should all be very glad and happy our brothers and sisters, no matter how old or their circumstances, have come to join us in our worship of God. We are a family. As Catholic Christians, they should know us by how we love each other.

# 14 DAY PILGRIMAGE TO SPAIN, PORTUGAL & MOROCCO IN HONOR OF THE 100TH YR ANNIVERSARY OF FATIMA May 7 - May 20, 2017 WITH FR. SLAWEK IGNASIK OF ST. PETER THE APOSTLE PARISH, ITASCA

**ITINERARY** :

Day 1 - Depart Chicago O'Hare Airport.

Day 2 & 3 - Upon arrival in Barcelona we will meet our tour guide and begin a city tour by bus of the "second capital of Spain". We will visit the UNESCO World Heritage Sites for the works of Antoni Gaudi including the still incomplete basilica of Sagrada Familia with a projected completion in 2026, Casa Mila, and Casa Batllo. We will also visit the UNESCO World Heritage Sites of Palau de la Musica and Hospital de Sant Paul designed by Lluis Domenech i Montaner. We will walk through Barrio Gotico (the old town) to visit the Cathedral of St. Eulalia, the Jewish quarter, St. Mark's Square and the church of Santa Maria del Mar. We will visit La Rambla Street with its colorful markets. Dinners and overnights in Barcelona.

Day 4 - After breakfast we transfer to Valencia. We will visit the Cathedral of the Holy Chalice, the 'Miguelete' Bell Tower and Apostles gate. We will also see UNESCO World Heritage site, the Silk Exchange and the Central Market, Plaza de la Virgen (Virgin Mary Square), Round Squre, and the Old Quarter. Dinner and overnight at hotel in Valencia.

Day 5 - After breakfast, we will stop at Caravaca de La Cruz, one of the 5th holy cities in the world. A jubilee year at Caravacas Basillica, it holds fragments of the cross upon which Christ died. We will then proceed to Murcia the capitol of the Murcia region. From the seventeenth century, and especially in the eighteenth, Murcia achieved a splendour that expanded beyond its walls. At this time, numerous churches were built in the city, including la Merced, San Miguel, Santa Ana, the Monastery of Santa Clara el Real, Santo Domingo, Santa Eulalia and San Juan de Dios. The Cathedral of Santa Maria, contains both Renaissance & Baroque and features the beautiful altar piece by Jaime Bort, combining wisdom with sculpture and architecture . Dinner and overnight in Murcia.

Day 6 - After breakfast we will depart for Granada to see the stunningly beautiful UNESCO World Heritage Sites Alhambra, Generalfe and Albayzin. We will also visit the Cathedral & Royal Chamber. Dinner & overnight at hotel in Malaga.
