

Dear parish family,

As Catholics, we are called to respond to the needs of the poor in our area and elsewhere. Together with past benefactors, you have given generously to second collections and to other charities that the larger Church has asked us to support. Thank you to all parishioners who have donated and supported these charities.

For 27 years, St. Peter the Apostle has partnered with "Bridge Communities" to provide an apartment and mentoring for a family with children that would otherwise be homeless. The parish has been contributing to this cause every month. The recently sponsored family has now graduated out of the program. Bridge Communities and our parish's Transitional Housing Ministry are currently screening new family candidates. St. Peter's contributes \$1,025 per month to continue the partnership and provide the apartment for the sponsored family. St. Peter's Transitional Housing Ministry is looking for monetary donations specifically to help cover the cost, as we hope to expand the giving from our "Parish Poor Fund" to additional noble causes. We need your regular financial support to make this a reality. Please contact Adam if you wish to donate to this worthy cause, as well as if you would like to become involved with the Transitional Housing Ministry.

Besides financial help, our parish also makes an effort to help the needy by collecting non-perishable food, household, and personal hygiene supplies. Please make a habit of bringing these items to church each month. The items can be placed in the wooden bin in the narthex. Collected donations are regularly delivered to the Itasca Food Pantry.

The spiritual work of almsgiving is a necessary part of Christian life for the individual Catholic. It is also an essential element of good stewardship. We need to make a conscious, regular, and generous effort to provide for those in need. To that end, and in addition to the monthly "My Gift to our Parish Poor Fund" envelope in your packets, "Poor Boxes" have been installed near the entrances of the church (bronze boxes mounted on the walls marked "for the poor") to receive consistent monetary gifts for the poor.

Monies received will be placed in our St. Vincent Parish Poor Fund. It is from this charitable fund that the parish provides for the needs of the poor and the programs we support. The mercy, compassion, and love of God is our greatest treasure and should be the focus of our lives. In obedience to Christ's command to "love one another as I have loved you," we must reach out in love and out of concern for those around us, especially God's poor. In giving alms, Scripture says, "our left hand is not to know what our right hand is doing, for our Father who sees in secret will repay us." Giving alms is to include the element of sacrifice. We are to give until we "notice" or "feel" that we are giving. For each person, the amount will vary, and the amount of the gift is unimportant. The Lord does not ask for equal gifts. He demands equal sacrifice.






Blessing of Motorcycles

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflection - Gospel Reading: Luke 11:1-13

Jesus teaches the disciples about prayer.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Luke gives more attention to Jesus' teachings on prayer than any other Gospel writer. He also mentions Jesus at prayer more than the others. In today's reading, from the beginning of Chapter 11 of his Gospel, Luke presents the core of Jesus' teaching on prayer. It consists of Jesus teaching a prayer to his disciples, a parable on the persistent neighbor, and assurances that God hears our prayers.


The disciples notice Jesus praying "in a certain place." They ask him to teach them to pray just as John the Baptist had taught his disciples. Jesus teaches them a simple version of the most famous Christian prayer, the Our Father, or the Lord's Prayer. Matthew's version shows signs of being shaped by public prayer. Luke's version is probably closer to the original form that Jesus taught. Stripped of much of the language we are used to, Luke's version seems simple and direct. We pray that God's name will be recognized as holy and that his rule over all will be established. This is followed by petitions for our needs for bread, for forgiveness, and for deliverance. Luke uses the more theological language of "sins" rather than "debts," which is used in Matthew's version.

Having taught his disciples a simple, daily prayer, Jesus goes on to reassure them that God answers prayers. First he tells a parable about a persistent neighbor who asks a friend for bread at midnight. The friend is already in bed and has no desire to disturb his family by opening the door. But because the neighbor is persistent, the sleeping man gets up and gives him all that he needs. If a neighbor is willing to help us if we are persistent enough, how could God not respond to our requests?

This teaching concludes with the reminder that if we seek, we will get a response. If a human father, with all his faults, knows how to give good gifts to his children, how much more will our heavenly Father give us? Instead of good gifts, however, Luke substitutes the word *Holy Spirit*. This foreshadows the gift of the Holy Spirit, who is central to Luke's theology and who will play an important role in the growth of the early Church after Pentecost.

The parable and the concluding teaching in this section should not lead us to think of prayer as a series of requests presented to God. Rather, as Jesus teaches in his model prayer, prayer consists in recognizing God's holiness and his rule over all things.

Editorial: What a Catholic president should do

Nearly 50 years after Justice Harry Blackmun discovered the "right" to an abortion in the "penumbras" and "emanations" of the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, Justice Samuel Alito revealed that this right was as real as the emperor's new clothes. With the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*,

overturning *Roe v. Wade* (1973) and *Planned Parenthood v. Casey* (1992) and returning regulation of abortion to the states, federal interference in the various states' protection of the life of the unborn should have come to an end.

Instead, two weeks to the day after the court released its decision in *Dobbs*, President Joe Biden signed an executive order to try to blunt the effect of the ruling and to reassert federal authority over abortion.

In signing his executive order, Biden characterized Justice Alito's opinion as "extreme," "totally wrongheaded" and "an exercise in raw political power" that "wasn't a constitutional judgment." None of the reporters present at the White House signing ceremony asked him what he thought of the statement released by the newly minted junior senator from Delaware in January 1973. The young Joe Biden spoke with the mind of the Church, declaring that *Roe v. Wade* "was not correctly decided" and that "the right of abortion was not secured by the Constitution."

President Biden's Catholic faith was frequently mentioned by the secular media in the months leading up to the 2020 presidential election. Unsurprisingly, it was rarely referred to in their reports on the signing of his executive order.

In the White House on July 8, the country's second Catholic president missed the opportunity of a century to demonstrate that the Church's teaching on the sanctity of life does not, as so many advocates for abortion argue, extend only to the unborn child.

President Biden could have supported the expansion of the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) to companies with fewer than 50 employees and the conversion of some portion of that leave from unpaid to paid. He could have called for caps to be placed on the cost of health-insurance premiums for women of childbearing age and for the expansion of Medicaid coverage and food-assistance programs for low-income families. He could have announced new federal partnerships with the states and with nonprofit organizations to make adoption services more broadly available and more affordable. He could have worked with members of his party in Congress to introduce legislation to transform the federally mandated minimum wage into a true living wage that would allow more families to get by on a single income. He could have reached across party lines to pledge federal support for similar state and local programs consistent with a culture of life.

Had he done so, every article, every radio and television news report, would have mentioned that these initiatives were the concrete manifestation of the president's deep and abiding Catholic faith, and pundits of nearly every political stripe would have praised him for attempting to bring all Americans together.

But President Biden chose to do none of these things. Instead, he turned the moment into a crassly political one, urging women to "turn out in record numbers to reclaim the rights that have been taken from them by the court." He ordered the secretary of Health and Human Services, Xavier Becerra, to ensure widespread access to the abortion drug RU-486 and to expand the distribution of "emergency contraception," which works by preventing the implantation of a fertilized egg in the uterine wall (and, in some cases, by causing the uterus to reject one already implanted). Like Biden, Becerra is a Catholic; as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives from California, he received in 2012 a 100% favorable rating from Planned Parenthood and NARAL Pro-Choice America, and, as the attorney general of California, he argued the government's case against the Little Sisters of the Poor when they sought exemption from the requirement to provide contraception under the Affordable Care Act.

In January 2021, while congratulating President Biden "on becoming the second Catholic to attain the highest office in the land," this editorial board urged him "to use that office to bring the wisdom of Catholic teaching to bear on all aspects of American policy, foreign and domestic." We prayed that "his own faith will be strengthened, and that he will reconsider those areas in which he personally and politically departs from Catholic teaching — chief among them the protection of the unborn."

At the same time, we reminded our readers that all of us "should follow the example of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, who have lent their support over the years to all good policies, regardless of the political persuasion of those who have put them forward." And we noted, too, that, "on those occasions when proposed policies would undermine the common good and threaten the health or the very lives of the most vulnerable, we must vigorously oppose such actions — even if the candidate for whom we voted is now the elected official proposing such policies."

This is one of those occasions.

We urge President Biden to rescind his executive order and to use the power of his office instead to show the world how a truly Catholic vision of a culture of life could unite this country and transform the future of the United States.





According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.
