

Sacred Music at Saint Peter the Apostle Parish MINISTRY OF CANTOR

Our parish has a very small team of cantors who volunteer a significant amount of time by preparing themselves vocally, musically and spiritually to lead us in liturgical song. Cantors bring to the ministry at least some experience, having sung seriously in choirs, or as soloists. The cantor's primary role is to lead the psalm during the Liturgy of the Word, in dialogue with the congregation. They also assist the congregation by leading the other parts of the liturgy.

I am asking teens and adults who feel called to this ministry to contact me or one of our parish musicians. Our worship of and prayer to Almighty God should be of good quality and true beauty. However, this depends on the Holy Spirit and our use of the gifts and talents that our God has bestowed upon each of us. Cantors do not need to have "soloist quality" voices. Rather, they should be able to sing in tune, have some proficiency in reading music, and sufficient time to devote to rehearsal and preparation. This ministry is of utmost importance in our parish. Cantors must be willing to serve at 2 to 4 Masses each month, sometimes twice in a weekend. More information is available from me or any of our parish musicians, so please contact one of us. Training will be provided. Thank you for your consideration in answer to this much-needed ministry at our parish.



Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

In the synagogue at Nazareth, Jesus reads aloud from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah and announces that this Scripture is now fulfilled.

Today's Gospel reading combines two separate passages taken from the Gospel of Luke. First we hear the opening verses where Luke establishes the purpose of his Gospel. His style is typical of polished Greek and Roman literature. In this passage, we learn that Luke may have written to a specific person, Theophilus; but the word Theophilus may also be a general reference, functioning as the phrase "Dear Reader" might in contemporary writing. In Greek, the word Theophilus translates as "lover of God."

Today's Gospel reading then skips several chapters in which one would find the Infancy Narratives, Jesus' baptism by John, the temptations Jesus faced in the desert, and the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. In chapter four of Luke's Gospel, we hear that Jesus is in his hometown of Nazareth, attending the synagogue on the Sabbath, which is said to be his custom. In this account, we find another important clue that Jesus lived as a faithful, observant Jew. We will continue to read from Luke's Gospel in sequence for the next two Sundays.

As Jesus stands in the synagogue, he reads from the scroll handed to him; it contains the words of the prophet Isaiah. At this early moment in his ministry, Jesus announces his mission in continuity with Israel's prophetic tradition. This reading from Isaiah defines Jesus' ministry. We will find more evidence of this as we continue to read from Luke's Gospel throughout the year. Jesus' ministry will include bringing glad tidings to the poor, liberty to captives, healing to the sick, freedom to the oppressed, and proclaiming a year acceptable to the Lord.

Through this text from Isaiah, Jesus announces God's salvation. The "year acceptable to the Lord" is a reference to the Jewish tradition of Sabbath years and jubilee. The Sabbath year was observed every seventh year. It was a year of rest when land was left fallow and food stores were to be shared equally with all. A year of Jubilee was celebrated every fiftieth year, the conclusion of seven cycles of Sabbath years. It was a year of renewal in which debts were forgiven and slaves were freed.

This tradition of Jubilee is the framework for God's promise of salvation. And yet in Jesus, something new begins. Jesus not only announces God's salvation, he brings this salvation about in his person. Jesus is Yahweh's Anointed One, filled with the Spirit of God. The Kingdom of God is now at hand. It is made present in Jesus, in his life, death, and Resurrection. Jesus will send the Holy Spirit so that the Kingdom of God can be fulfilled.

The Holy Spirit is Jesus' gift to the Church. The Holy Spirit enables the Church to continue the mission of Jesus. When we do what Jesus did—bring glad tidings to the poor, liberty to captives, healing to the sick, and freedom to the oppressed we serve the Kingdom of God. Catholic Parents: "Give your children Christian Names"

-Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI

During his Pontificate, Pope Benedict reminded Catholic parents throughout the world that they should be choosing Christian names for their children. The choice of a name, he emphasized, shouldn't be done "by chance" or whim, but should reinforce and communicate to the growing child and others one of the essential realities of the sacrament of baptism and the Christian life. The Christian name — in contrast to a non-Christian name - signifies that in baptism "every baptized person acquires the character of a son" and is "an unmistakable sign that the Holy Spirit gives birth to man 'anew' from the womb of the Church." A Christian name manifests that through baptism a child is "raised to the supernatural order" and "placed in communication with God," who then calls that child by that given name. Naming the child after a Christian saint or Biblical hero is a concrete reminder for the child and everyone else that God is calling that child, like his or her Christian namesake, to holiness and heaven.

Much of this connection has been getting gradually lost in Christian practice, which is the reason why Pope Benedict needed to bring it to our attention. Recently, the Social Security Administration published a list of the 1,000 most popular boys' and girls' names chosen by American parents in 2009. The main headline for most of the press accounts was that the name "Mary" — which in every year from 1910-1965 was either the first or the second most popular girls' name — was no longer even in the top 100. On the boys' side, things are not much better. Beginning in 1910, when the frequency of names began to be documented, through 1972, the names of the foster father of Jesus and of the four evangelists were firmly entrenched in the top ten each year.

At a human level, one of the first and most long-lasting gifts or burdens — parents give to a child is a name. This is the way the child will generally be referred to for the rest of his or her life. The child will hear that name literally millions of times over the course of a lifetime. The choice of a name can have a profound impact on the child's development and self-identity.

A child's name should not be treated like an email handle with which one can basically get as creative as one wants. A child's name, rather, communicates in a sense a person's identity and can dramatically impact a child's development.

The name is a holy icon of the person. In our age of titular iconoclasm, Pope Benedict is calling Christian parents back to connect the names of their children with the name of God and the names of those who have lived — and continue to live forever — in God's holy name, entrusting their children to their namesakes' saintly patronage so that one day the Good Shepherd will call those children to his eternal right side by the names they've chosen for them.


A nightly Rosary and Reflection will take place in the Church January 19-27 at 7:15pm.





BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.
