From the **Pastor**

Dear Parish family,

Today we are celebrating the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Holy Week is fast approaching. I want to encourage all of you to make time for the Lord to speak to your heart over the next few weeks.

I realize that we all have our schedules, agendas and routines, but there comes a time when we need to focus on what truly counts. As we come closer to the end of Lent and prepare for Holy Week and Easter, what counts — the only thing that matters — is the salvation of our souls! The next few weeks, especially next week — the only week in the year that is called "Holy" — we should focus our attention on our relationship with the Lord, our sorrow for our sins, and our desire for Heaven.

Next Saturday, the day before Palm Sunday, from 9:00am until 3:00pm, you will have an opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation with several priests from our area to help you. Priests from our deanery will be stationed both at Saint Peter the Apostle Parish and Visitation Parish in Elmhurst to hear your confession that day. Attending to the Sacrament of Reconciliation, no matter how long it has been for you, is an essential and holy way to prepare yourself for the celebration of the ancient and beautiful liturgies of Holy Week, which begins Next Sunday with Palm Sunday. An opportunity to receive the Lord and His forgiveness and grace will make you ready spiritually for these Holy Days which celebrate the Paschal Mystery of Christ, namely His Passion, Death and Resurrection.

Traditionally, beginning today, the Fifth Sunday of Lent, we enter into what was called Passiontide. The penance and discipline of Lent change focus a bit. The prayers, readings, and songs of the Mass now focus our attention on the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus — The Paschal Mystery — and the events leading up to this central mystery and belief of our faith as Catholic Christians. Together, let's take seriously the Church's invitation to focus our attention, devotion, and energy upon the celebration of this last week of Lent and celebrations of Holy Week. Let's give the Lord our hearts, in the hope of His promise of Heaven. I hope to see all of you for the many devotions, Masses, and services in the weeks ahead.

Remember to receive the divine mercy of Jesus Christ by confessing your sins this week.

Stations of the Cross are celebrated on Fridays at 6:30 pm. Please see the schedule on the parish website. The Stations of the Cross is a devotional service which traces Jesus' journey from the trial before Pilate to His death on Calvary.

Tradition tells us that the places of visitation, the "stations," were those visited by the Blessed Virgin Mary after the resurrection of Jesus. Through the ages, people would walk from station to station trying to mirror the physical pilgrimage of going from place to place in Jerusalem. The form of the Stations of the Cross has changed over the centuries, but the devotion still carries the same meaning and is a traditional part of Lent.

Recently, the parish invited sound and microphone companies and consultants to come out to investigate a poor sound quality problems in the church. Before doing anything or spending any money, it was suggested that the parish hire an acoustical consultant who comes highly recommended and has done work at churches throughout Illinois and Wisconsin.

Throughout the church, there are certain areas that are more problematic than others. Parishioners are being asked to help identify those areas so that we can provide the consultant with the data on specific problems. A short form is available to complete after mass asking you to identify the problem you are experiencing and where you were sitting.

Once the consultant has completed the measurement session, and with your data, the parish will receive a report explaining the results including remediation options. The parish will then have to hire vendors to adjust the speakers in the church and install other required materials such as high-quality absorption panels.

Preliminary estimates for the consultation fee are approximately \$3,000 and cost estimate for materials and other equipment changes may be as high as \$30,000.

If we want to correct the situation, we will first need to raise the necessary funds to cover the project. The Parish Finance Council is in agreement that the parish should address the situation. If you are interested and willing to assist in the funding of this important project, please call Fr. Noesen.

LENTEN REGULATIONS REGARDING FAST AND ABSTINENCE

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent including Good Friday.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating between meals is not permitted.

By the threefold discipline of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer the Church keeps Lent from Ash Wednesday until the evening of Holy Thursday. All of the faithful should undertake the serious practice of these three traditions. Failure to observe penitential days totally or a substantial number of such days must be considered serious. Our US Bishops issued in 1966 this statement on penitential observance:

"On Weekdays of Lent, we strongly recommend participation in daily Mass and self-imposed observances of fasting. In light of grave human needs which weigh on the Christian conscience in all seasons, we urge particularly during Lent, generosity to local, national and world programs of sharing of all things needed to translate our duty to penance into a means of implementing the right of the poor to their part of our abundance."

An Examination of Conscience

Questions that can be used for examining one's conscience before going to the Sacrament of Penance:

- Do I love God like with my whole heart, soul and being?
 Do I give him the first place in my life? Do I eagerly reject all idols that could get between him and me, be it money, pleasure, superstition, or power? Do I listen with faith to his Word?
 Do I persevere in prayer?
- Do I respect the holy name of God? Do I abuse him in my references to him, offending him, or making use of him, instead of serving him? Do I bless God in each one of my actions? Do I surrender myself without reserve to his will for me, trusting entirely in him? Do I entrust myself with humility and confidence to the guidance and teaching of the pastors which the Lord has given to his Church? Do I make an effort to go deeper in and strengthen my life of faith?
- Do I make Sunday the center of my week, beginning with the most important moment, the celebration of the Eucharist? Do I use it, and the other days consecrated to the Lord, to praise and give thanks to God, to entrust myself to him and take rest in him? Do I participate faithfully and actively in the liturgy, preparing myself beforehand with prayer, and making the effort to obtain its fruits during the entire week? Do I sanctify the holy day with some act of love toward the needy?
- Do I love and respect those who have given me life? Do I make the effort to understand and help them, above all in their weaknesses and limits?
- Do I make the effort to respect and promote life in all of its stages and aspects? Do I do everything in my power to promote the good of the others? Have I done evil to someone with the explicit intention of doing it?
- How do I live charity toward my neighbor? Am I attentive and available, above all with the poorest and weakest? Do I love myself, knowing how to accept my limits under the gaze of God?
- Am I chaste in thoughts and actions? Do I make the effort to love with gratitude, free of the temptation to possess or be jealous? Do I always respect the dignity of the human person? Do I treat my body and the bodies of others as a temple of the Holy Spirit?
- Do I respect the goods of creation? Am I honest in my work and in my relations with my neighbor? Do I respect the fruit of others' labor? Am I envious of the goods of the others? Do I make an effort to make others happy, or do I only think of myself?
- Am I sincere and loyal in each word and action? Do I always speak only the truth? Do I try to give confidence and act in a way that inspires confidence in the others?
- Do I make an effort to follow the example of Christ in my life of surrender to God and my neighbor? Do I try to be like him: humble, poor and chaste? Do I faithfully find the Lord in the Sacraments, in fellowship, and in service to the poor? Do I live with hope in eternal life, seeing each thing under the light of God, always trusting in his promises?

veiling the cross in *PASSIONTIDE*

The Veiling of Images in Church...

Why? The true beauty and meaning of the Cross, for a time, hidden from our eyes.

In 1988, The Congregation for Worship in Rome issued a document lauding the practice of restoring the practice of veiling crucifixes and images in the church. Actually, the practice was never completely done-away with. But, over the 40 years or so since Vatican II, the practice fell out of use for a number of reasons. The custom is to veil from before first vespers or the vigil Mass of the *Fifth Sunday of Lent* until the Easter Vigil. In some places images and statues are actually removed from the church and not simply veiled, especially after Holy Thursday. Crosses are unveiled after the Good Friday ceremonies. Neither the Stations of the Cross nor stained glass windows are ever veiled. The veils for images are usually made of purple cloth without any decoration. Crucifixes are veiled in red, the color of the passion.

The custom of veiling crosses and images has much to commend it in terms of religious psychology, because it helps us to concentrate on the great essentials of Christ's work of Redemption. Although this is true, the historical origin of this practice lies elsewhere. It probably derives from a custom, noted in Germany from the ninth century, of extending a large cloth before the altar from the beginning of Lent. This cloth, called the *Hungertuch* (hunger cloth), hid the altar entirely from the faithful during Lent and was not removed until during the reading of the Passion on Holy Wednesday at the words "the veil of the temple was rent in two." Some authors say there was a practical reason for this practice insofar as the often-illiterate faithful needed a way to know it was Lent. Others, however, maintain that it was a remnant of the ancient practice of public penance in which the penitents were ritually expelled from the church at the beginning of Lent. After the ritual of public penance fell into disuse — but the entire congregation symbolically entered the order of penitents by receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday — it was no longer possible to expel them from the church. Rather, the altar or "Holy of Holies" was shielded from view until they were reconciled to God at Easter. For analogous motives, later on in the Middle Ages, the images of crosses and saints were also covered from the start of Lent. The rule of limiting this veiling to Passiontide came later and does not appear until the 17th century.

After the Second Vatican Council there were moves to abolish all veiling of images, but the practice survived, although the practice has changed from previous custom. As we move toward Holy Week, and the celebration of the Lord's Passion and Death, more and more the Lenten purple is replaced by the red of the passion. A reminder of the Blood of Jesus. A red veil is placed on the cross to remind us that the true meaning, the real beauty of the Cross is (for a time) hidden or veiled from our eyes. The Glory of the Cross is stained and covered by the Blood of Christ's suffering. The practice of veiling the cross goes back many centuries and is meant to make us take a second look. It is meant to let us know that something is different. Just as the "veil" was removed from the eyes of the disciples at Easter, so too, the red veil [a symbol of the suffering and death of Jesus that "hides" from our eyes the real meaning of His Passion and Death — the true beauty and meaning of the Cross] will be removed when we come to Mass on Easter.

As we approach the coming days of Holy Week when we celebrate the liturgies of the Lord's Paschal Mystery, enter into the true meaning of these holy days. Make the sacrifice of time and effort to join us for the beautiful liturgies of this Passion-time, and Holy Week.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We, the diocesan bishops of Illinois, write today out of great concern. Bills have been introduced before the Illinois General Assembly to repeal Illinois' Parental Notice of Abortion Act. They are House Bill 1797 and Senate Bill 2190. The enactment of this legislation would lead to tragic and irreversible outcomes.

The Parental Notice of Abortion Act simply requires that when a minor girl seeks to have an abortion, a parent or guardian is notified 48 hours before the procedure. The obvious hope of the law is that parents, by their deep love and moral obligation, will act to protect, support and guide their children. In every other facet of life, we are taught – and we teach – that parental involvement is key to the child's best interest. Repealing the Act is nothing less than an invasion into the sacred space of family life by the state, with no provision to support the minor emotionally, humanely or materially at a critical moment in her life.

It is unfortunately true that not all young people come from loving homes. In these cases, when the threat of abuse or neglect outweighs the rights of parents, the current law allows a young girl the opportunity to declare in writing that there is abuse, or she can seek an emergency hearing before a judge to explain her situation. We acknowledge that this can be emotionally difficult; however, such difficulty must be weighed against the harm done when our laws effectively undermine family life by separating children from the care of parents who love them the most. The state should do everything to support families, not destabilize them.

The existing Parental Notice of Abortion Act provides important safeguards against the evils of sexual abuse and human trafficking. If a minor girl can be taken by any adult man to an abortion clinic, in the hopes of erasing the evidence of his abuse, what protection exists outside of the girl's parent or guardian being informed? Why would we want to create such a dangerous environment?

Simply put, the Parental Notice of Abortion Act works. According to statistics gathered by the Illinois Department of Public Health, since the law's final enactment by the Illinois Supreme Court in 2013, abortions performed on minors in Illinois have decreased over 30 percent. The lives saved by this law are real and present among us.

These are the reasons every state in the Midwest and 37 states overall have laws requiring some form of parental involvement in the decision of a minor to have an abortion. Illinois has been among those states for 8 years and no obvious problems or detriments have been publicly exposed. The repeal of Parental Notice of Abortion is a tragic solution in search of a problem.

So what can you do? As Catholics of good will, we call on you to engage your elected officials – state representatives, state senators and the Governor – and urge them to oppose House Bill 1797 and Senate Bill 2190.

Possible methods of contact include phone calls, letters, emails, and Zoom meetings between legislators and you, their concerned constituents. For all of these efforts, you will need to be able to identify your legislators and secure the appropriate contact information. Here is how:

Visit the Catholic Conference of Illinois' website – www.ilcatholic.org – scroll nearly to the bottom of the homepage, click on "Find Your Legislator" and input the asked-for information. Doing this will identify one's state elected officials, and simply clicking on their names will provide the contact information.

In our concern for all human life, and particularly for the struggles of young girls in these difficult circumstances and their unborn children, we ask you to participate in this effort. Together we are strong, and we can make a difference.

BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:45 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.
