Dear Parish family,

Jesus came into the world not only to save us, but also to show us how we are to live and to love. He taught with words, and we need to learn and follow what he said; but He also taught with actions. When the people were hungry, he gave them bread to eat; when they were sick, he visited them and brought healing. In all its forms and stages, Christ showed great respect for life. He cared greatly for those around Him. His love, concern, and respect for people was consistent. And, as outdated, and out of step as that may seem to so many in our world - The Catholic view of Respect for Life is, like Christ's, very consistent.

Next Sunday we will observe Respect Life Sunday. In churches throughout the Country, Catholics and Christians are coming together in prayer to reflect on the meaning of this most important issue: Honoring and respecting life... in imitation of Jesus.

In today's first reading from the Book of Numbers, the Lord took some of the spirit that was on Moses and bestowed it on the seventy elders; the spirit rested upon them, and they prophesied. Oh, how much more we need prophets today!

When one in four children in their mother's womb are not safe from being killed by abortion. When euthanasia is advocated as a way of ending the lives of those who are terminally ill, or mentally impaired. When marriage is viewed as a legal contract whose meaning is debated by legislators and jurists, and not as a sacred covenant given by God. When family breaks more than it thrives. When the very old and the very young are neglected, forgotten, abused, and seen as dispensable. Yes, we certainly need to pray that the Spirit of God fall on all people with a voice - we have a great need for prophets today... people who are willing and able to imitate Jesus in His care and respect for others, for all life.

Mention Respect for Life and everyone thinks abortion. And that's a good place to start because you would think that would be an easy one to agree upon - taking a human life in the womb is obviously wrong and immoral. Yet, it is a controversy that tears at our Nation's fabric and wrenches the heart of society.

When it was first introduced in the US, many thought legal abortion would be the answer to all our social problems - abortion would eradicate poverty by eradicating the poor. End the cycle of poverty by ending the lives of even the most innocent. Yet we see, even in a growing economy, that poverty and abuse still exist. Many thought abortion would be the great liberating element for women in society - and yet, abortion enslaves women, men, children, it truly hurts ethnic groups as well, including blacks and Hispanics. Doctors, pharmacists and nurses who have the skill to heal, are instead forced to directly kill through abortion and euthanasia. Society itself is enslaved - no one is freed by rejecting God's gift of life. Certainly, there seems to be a great need for prophets in today's world!

Jesus is very clear in today's Gospel... Whoever is not against us is for us. Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, will likewise be held accountable before the Lord. The "little ones" are Christ's disciples, and it is clear from His words that nothing in life is worth more than virtue.

Not even my hand, my foot or my eye is worth more than doing what God requires of me. That is why preaching and working for the Gospel of Life is so essential. The choice is clear: obedience or dis-obedience, life or death, virtue or sin, heaven or hell.

As we begin this Respect Life month, do what you can to become more informed about the many issues of the Respect Life movement. Other issues are important too, such as immigrants' rights and care for the poor. Without respect for life at its beginning, all of these other respect for life issues easily fade and fall away.


Let us truly be prophets and stand up and when we have the opportunity to vote, vote properly for those politicians who promote a culture of life, not a culture of death. Choose wisely in all that you do, including your right to vote for those who make and enforce our laws as Americans and as citizens of Illinois. This is what it means to defend the Gospel of Life, to be a prophet, a prophet that seeks to imitate Jesus!

This coming week, I will be attending the bi-annual Convocation of Priests for the Diocese of Joliet. I'll be gone from Monday until Friday (September 27-October 1). Because all priests of the Diocese are required to attend this meeting with our Bishop, daily masses will NOT be celebrated on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday this week. Deacon Fred will offer Communion services on those days. Masses will be celebrated at 8:00am on Monday, Friday and Saturday. Of course, I will be in contact with the Parish Office should emergency situations arise that need my attention.

I ask you to pray for Bishop Hicks and all of the priests of the Diocese of Joliet who will gather for these days of prayer, education, priestly formation, and fellowship. The days of Convocation are "full," but it is wonderful when all of the priests are together with our Bishop.




you were pleased to appear to the children of Fatima and reveal a glorious message.

"Take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them; otherwise, you will have no recompense from your Heavenly Father. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing."

The spiritual work of almsgiving is an essential part of our Catholic faith. We need to make a conscious, regular, and generous effort to provide for those in need. Many years ago, our parish established a fund, named after Saint Vincent de Paul, to assist those in need. Each month, parishioners have been asked to use their monthly envelopes to contribute to this fund. If you do not receive monthly parish envelopes, I encourage you to contribute to



this needy fund either online through our parish website or send in a donation marked St. Vincent Poor Fund.

The mercy, compassion, and love of God is our greatest treasure and should be the focus of our lives. His mercy is seen perfectly in the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the saints. In particular, Saint Vincent de Paul was one who called the rich, the not so rich, and the clergy of France to do what they could to meet the many needs of the poor. Saint Vincent called the people of his day to become mercy itself. He preached and taught others to live out their Catholic faith so as to experience in their own lives the love and mercy of God. We are called to put the mercy and love we have received from the hand of God into action in our own lives. In Christ's name, at our parish, through our Saint Vincent Poor Fund, we extend assistance to those in need. In obedience to His command to "love one another as I have loved you," we must reach out in love and in concern to those around us especially to God's poor.

One way we do that is through almsgiving. In giving alms, Scripture says, our "left hand is not to know what our right hand is doing, for our Father who sees in secret will repay us." When we give alms for love of Jesus to help those who are in need and to help ourselves, only then do our gifts become true corporal works of mercy. True alms should also include the element of sacrifice. We are to give until we can feel the sacrifice in our giving. For each person, the amount varies, and the amount of the gift is unimportant. The Lord does not ask equal gifts. He demands equal sacrifice.

Regular requests are made of the parish for assistance from individuals and various organizations institutions who assist those in need. These requests have been ongoing for years. Our parish currently contributes hundreds of dollars a month to public housing in our area. We are also currently assisting with the rent for a mother and her two young children. We give financial gifts and non-perishable food and household items to the Itasca Food Pantry. Other contributions are also made when the parish is called to respond to legitimate and serious requests for assistance. In the past, a few parishioners have helped former pastors with the management of this fund. Presently, there is no one helping on a regular basis. A few weeks ago, I asked parishioners to consider helping form a Saint Vincent Committee that would help oversee our parish fund and help to decide how we can be of greater assistance as a parish community. Although no one has stepped forward as yet, I am hopeful that some parishioners are still discerning and will make a commitment to this committee.

As we celebrate the **Feast of Saint Vincent de Paul this week on September 27**, I hope more of you will reach out to the poor and live your faith through good works for them. The Saint Vincent Poor Fund at our parish is one concrete way to help consistently. In addition to the monthly Saint Vincent envelope in your packets, I would like help in purchasing "poor boxes" to be installed near the entrance of the church. Monies received will be placed in the Saint Vincent Fund. It is from this single charitable fund that our parish will continue to provide for the needs of the poor, contribute to the programs we already support, and hopefully increase our care for God's poor.

Make it a regular habit to provide for those in need. The Lord will bless you abundantly for your generosity. I personally thank you all who consistently give and to the past benefactors of the parish who regularly gave to the Saint Vincent de Paul Poor Fund. Sincerely in Christ,

What's the history of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament?

It seems that several parishes have Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, either as a regular practice or just on occasion, as is done at Saint Peter the Apostle Parish, once a month.

Is Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament something new? Isn't the celebration of the Mass enough?


Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is not something new. It is a centuries-old practice rooted in an essential teaching of Catholic Christianity: Jesus Christ is truly and completely present in the Eucharist. Like many practices of our faith, however, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament developed gradually.

In the earliest years of Christianity, consecrated hosts would be brought home from the celebration of the Eucharist to be given to those not able to be present at the liturgy because of illness. The hosts were to be consumed by the faithful during the week to keep them connected to the Eucharist and the community they celebrated with. In about the fourth century, monasteries began to reserve the Eucharist, and by the 11th century, reservation—still mainly for the sick and dying—was a regular feature of churches. While reverence was certainly given to Christ present in the sacrament, it was not yet customary to pray before the reserved Sacrament.

In the 11th century the French monk Berengar of Tours began to teach that the bread and wine in the celebration of the Eucharist could not change physically into the body and blood of Jesus Christ. Pope Gregory VII demanded a retraction from Berengar, saying that the body and blood of Christ were truly present in the Eucharist. This resulted in a refining of the church's teaching on the real presence. In response, Eucharistic devotion burst forth throughout Europe: processions, visits to the Blessed Sacrament, and other prayers focused on the reserved sacrament became part of Catholic life. Around the same time, elevations of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ were added to the Eucharistic prayer at Mass. For some, the moment of seeing the consecrated host overshadowed the rest of the liturgy. Times of extended exposition of the Blessed Sacrament outside the Mass grew out of this action, and eventually a blessing with the exposed Eucharist, or Benediction, developed. The Feast of Corpus Christi developed in the 13th and 14th centuries. Processions became traditional on this day, and other devotions, including adoration, gained popularity. Eucharistic Congresses, held since the late 19th century continue to promote this devotion.

Since the Second Vatican Council, a great deal of attention has focused on the reform of the liturgy and a deepening of Eucharistic theology and piety, but the practice of adoration remained in many places. Like the practice of the earliest Christians, adoration can keep us connected to the community's celebration of the Eucharist.



The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information. Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.

Additionally, before being admitted to a hospital for surgery, it is advisable to call Fr. Noesen to arrange to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Please contact the Parish Center at 630-773-1272 (ext. 200) to arrange for communion visits to the homebound.

FUNERALS

It is the responsibility of the parish to bury their dead. The funeral director will contact the Parish Center regarding arrangements. Funerals are ordinarily celebrated at 10:00 am. For more information, please read guidelines for Funeral Planning on the parish website.



If it is too difficult for you to walk to the front of the church to receive Communion, please know that at each Mass an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion comes to the back of the church to distribute Communion. If you would like to have the Extraordinary Minister give you communion in the back of church, please let an usher know

before Mass begins. At Communion time, when you see the Extraordinary Minister come to the back, please raise your hand so that they can see you and give you Holy Communion.
