From the Administrator...

IN VERITATE ET IN CARITATE

Our Easter celebration continues, alleluia! This, the fourth Sunday of Easter, is known as Good Shepherd Sunday. The theme of the readings, especially the Gospel message from John, illustrate for us the role of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. He calls his sheep to Him. They hear and know His voice and come to Him.

During Jesus' time on Earth, the image of a shepherd was one that was well-known. Shepherds committed their life to their flocks. They were with them twenty-four hours a day. The guarded and protected their sheep from dangers like predators like wolves and the occasional lion. They would lead the sheep to shelter during storms and bad weather, and to green pastures, providing them with the food and water that they needed to stay healthy.

Because they spent most of their lives out in the fields, living away from communities and civilization, many considered shepherds to be lower-class people. With the "smell of sheep" on them, they weren't often welcomed at gatherings of "proper society" and were not well-received by others. They were shunned.

Jesus continues His role of Good Shepherd today, calling to His sheep and gathering them into the safety of His sheepfold, the Holy Catholic Church. He is calling to us; do we hear His voice? As we go about our normal routine, do we notice the call of Christ, striving to lead us away from sin and toward the green pastures of holiness and peace? Do we only hear His voice in church once a week during the mass, or do we make an effort to find time throughout our week to listen for Him; in appropriate television and radio programs, affirming social media sites and books and magazines with moral content?

When we choose to turn away from evil, and all the temptations and allurements of the world, we too may find ourselves being treated by others as "shepherds". When we affirm the teachings of the Church on life, sexuality, marriage, and a host of other controversial issues, we may be shunned by those who have other views. When we have "the smell of sheep", living our Catholic faith actively and openly, others may not accept us.

So, we must choose. Do we let the world lead us along, wandering further and further from our faith? Or, do we "run away" from them, not recognizing the voice of these strangers, and following the call of our Lord? The Good Shepherd lays down His life for His sheep. I pray that we have the faith and courage to hear His Voice and follow Him.





Fourth Sunday of Easter

REFLECTION - GOSPEL READING:

John 10:1-10

Jesus is the gate for his sheep.

Background on the Gospel Reading

This fourth Sunday of the Easter season is sometimes called Good Shepherd Sunday because in each of the three lectionary cycles, the Gospel reading invites us to reflect on Jesus as the Good Shepherd. In each cycle the reading is from the tenth chapter of John's Gospel. This chapter sets the framework for Jesus' teaching about himself as the Good Shepherd.

Today's reading falls between the stories of Jesus' healing of the man born blind and the raising of Lazarus. Both of these stories were proclaimed in the Gospels found in this year's season of Lent. Following the controversy that ensued when Jesus healed the man born blind, Jesus directs his allegory about the sheep and the shepherd toward the Jewish religious leaders of his time, the Pharisees.

Throughout John's Gospel the Pharisees fail to accept Jesus' ministry and teaching. They show themselves to be "robbers and thieves" because they try to lead the sheep without entering through the gate, Jesus. Through these metaphors, Jesus is telling his listeners that those who follow him and his way will find abundant life. He identifies himself both as the shepherd and the gate. The shepherds who are faithful to him are the ones whom the sheep (Jesus' disciples) should follow.


The relationship between the sheep and their shepherd is based on familiarity. Sheep recognize their shepherd and will not follow a stranger. At the end of the day, shepherds lead their sheep from pastures to a common gated area called a sheepfold. There, one shepherd protects all of the sheep until the next day when each shepherd returns to lead his own sheep to pasture. As shepherds move among the sheep, the sheep follow only their shepherd.

Today's Gospel also gives us the opportunity to reflect on Christian leadership. Jesus' words suggest to us that those who will lead the Christian community will be known by their faithfulness to Jesus. The leaders will recognize that Jesus is the gate for all of the sheep and that having a good relationship with Jesus is the primary characteristic of a Christian leader. Jesus' allegory also suggests that faithful Christian leadership requires a good relationship with the community: the shepherd knows his sheep, and they know him. Christian leaders follow the example of Jesus, the Good Shepherd, by being faithful to him and by being a good shepherd.

GOSPEL MEDITATION: FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

April 30, 2023

I recently rescued a dog. She's a terrier and rather adorable. And she's crazy about me. She could spend all day with me. But I'm a pastor at a parish and sometimes I leave her at the front desk of the church office. She constantly amazes me by her ability to distinguish between my voice and that of everyone else. If I say one word, even if I'm hidden around a corner, she'll sprint toward me and jump up into my arms.

This week the readings focus our attention to the voice of the risen Jesus Christ. Comparing his disciples to sheep and himself to a shepherd, he says, "They recognize his voice." He speaks to us and wants us to respond. When we hear his voice, we follow. Throughout this coming week, we will experience many interior promptings to receive God's love, and to love Him in return. That's his voice. Follow it into the safe and tender arms of Christ.

By contrast, some voices we will hear do not convey God's concern and love for us, but rather produce fear, despair, and other harmful mischief. Jesus calls these voices those of robbers. Does an idea or thought make it harder for you to love God? If so, run away. Let it go. It is most likely not the voice of the Risen Lord. Keep waiting for him to speak. You will recognize his voice. Then run to him as fast as you can.


