Dear Parish Family:


Today is Respect Life Sunday. In churches throughout the United States, our focus this Sunday is on the precious gift of life and the God-given dignity of every human being. The entire month of October is dedicated to various aspects of the *Right to Life* movement. I encourage all of you to do what you can to become more familiar with all of the complex "life issues" that confront society today. To help educate yourself, check out the website of the Bishops of the United States and see what is available: **www.usccb.org/prolife**. You're sure to find some interesting reading.

The issue of respect for human life and the dignity of every person touches us from the moment of conception until natural death. You will notice that there seems to be a lot of focus on the abortion issue. In reality, this is only one of the many respect life issues we as a Church focus on during this month. However, abortion takes the "center stage" because the "right to life" is the starting point, the most fundamental of all rights ~ our founding fathers guaranteed the "tight to LIFE, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness to all citizens of our great nation." Sadly, those lofty ideals seem to have been lost in relativism and pursuit of the "self" that seems to have society in its grip. Life, created by God and worthy of all respect, is at its most vulnerable in the womb, and it needs our utmost care and protection. Life in the womb is life at its most innocent. All of the respect life issues begin with God's greatest gift, life itself. That's why this most fundamental right to life takes center stage among the various life issues we confront throughout our years on earth.

As we prepare for a historical election this coming November, it is always important to take time to educate yourself about the "life issues" that confront us. The life issues are dominant in the hierarchy of issues for the Catholic voter. But, above all, I encourage you to pray each day for a return to right judgment and morals among all the people and our leaders of this nation; an end of the sin of abortion in our time; a greater respect for life in all its forms and stages from the moment of conception until natural death; and for all, with God's help we have yet to accomplish. As we celebrate Our Lady of the Rosary this month, pray and ask the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of us all, that our hearts may be like hers, filled with love for all people, born and unborn, seeking God's will in all things.





Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults Program (R.C.I.A.)

Since then, no other institution or organization has spiritually cured, taught and led, fed, educated, cared and ministered to more people as we serve God and neighbor.

My life has been so enriched by my Catholic faith that I discerned God calling me to become a Deacon for His people. I love being healed and fed in the sacraments, reading Scripture and the Catholic catechism, studying the dignity of the human person in the context of morality, working with the poor and entering into fruitful dialogue with fellow believers. To me, being Catholic is awesome. I can say that I truly love my faith and my Lord Jesus.

Are you or a loved one interested in becoming Roman Catholic, or maybe someone you know? Maybe you might just like to inquire about and learn more about the Catholic Faith? 
RCIA is an ageless rite in the Church in which people are encouraged to advance to full maturity in the Catholic faith. They are taught the faith through the celebration of the Mass and prayer, through study, and through the manner of life. RCIA is a deep initiation or formational study of the Church's teachings so others become authentic, full-fledged, devout Roman Catholic Christians. It is a process where you will grow in faith and wisdom; a path that leads to receiving the Holy Trinity, i.e., the Father, Son and Holy Spirit in the sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation.

Join the RCIA and be freed from the world of falsehood, come to the fullness of understanding, unwavering faith, and a firm grasp of truth. Grow stronger in Christ and join in this large family of believers instituted by Christ Himself through Saint Peter and the apostles.

October: The Month of the Holy Rosary *Pray the Rosary!*

On October 7th we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. Our parish honors Our Lady by hosting the Pilgrim Virgin of Fatima statue during October, as well as offering a Rosary prayer service nightly at 7:00 pm the week of October 1-7. During the rest of the month and year-round, the Tuesday Evening Rosary is held weekly at 7:15pm

The Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary was originally instituted to celebrate the victories of the Papal Forces over the Turkish invaders in the Battle of Lepanto in the year 1573. The victory was attributed to the praying of the Rosary. The development of the Rosary has a long history. First, a practice was developed of praying 50 Our Fathers in imitation of the 150 Psalms. Then there was a parallel practice of praying 150 Hail Marys. Soon a mystery of Jesus' life was attached to each Hail Mary.

Through the legend, which tells of Mary giving the Rosary to St. Dominic, the Dominicans have done much to spread the devotion of the Rosary throughout the world. In the 16th century the Rosary developed into its present form ~ The 15 joyful, sorrowful and glorious mysteries. The purpose of the Rosary is to help us meditate on the great mysteries of salvation. Pope Pius XII called it a compendium of the Gospel. The main focus is on the Lord Jesus ~ His birth, life, death and resurrection. The Our Father reminds us that Jesus' Father is the initiator of salvation. The Hail Marys remind us to join with Mary in contemplating these mysteries. They also make us aware that Mary was and is intimately joined with her Son in all the mysteries of His earthly and heavenly existence. The Glorys remind us that the purpose of all life is the glory of the Holy Trinity.

The Rosary appeals to many. It is simple. The constant repetition of words helps create an atmosphere in which to contemplate the mysteries of God. We sense that Jesus and Mary are with us in the joys and sorrows of life. We grow in hope that God will bring us to share in the glory of Jesus and Mary forever. During this month of the Holy Rosary, remember to pray the Rosary alone and with your family. It is a beautiful mediation upon the mysteries of our redemption: And just as the Blessed Virgin Mary was immersed into the mysteries of the Lord's life, we too are invited into those same events so that we can inherit the promise of eternal life in Heaven with Him.

During this month of October, pray... and ask the Blessed Virgin Mary to pray for you, that you may be made worthy of the promises of Christ!


CELEBRATING OUR BLESSED MOTHER IN OCTOBER Pilgrim Virgin of Fatima

Respect Life Statement - October 2020

Most Reverend Joseph F. Naumann Chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Pro-Life Activities

As Catholics in the United States, we will soon mark our annual observance of October as Respect Life Month. It is a time to focus on God's precious gift of human life and our responsibility to care for, protect, and defend the lives of our brothers and sisters.

This year's theme, 'Live the Gospel of Life,' was inspired by the commemoration of the 25th anniversary of Pope John Paul II's encyclical, *The Gospel of Life*. Pope John Paul's masterfully articulated defense of the right to life for children in their mothers' wombs, the elderly, persons with disabilities, and the marginalized is more relevant today than ever before.

Last November, the U.S. bishops reaffirmed that 'the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed.' While we noted not to 'dismiss or ignore other serious threats to human life and dignity such as racism, the environmental crisis, poverty, and the death penalty,' we renewed our commitment to protect the most fundamental of all human rights – the right to live.

This past January, I shared with Pope Francis that the bishops of the United States had been criticized by some for identifying the protection of the unborn as a preeminent priority. The Holy Father expressed his support for our efforts observing that if we fail to protect life, no other rights matter. Pope Francis also said that abortion is not primarily a Catholic or even a religious issue, it is first and foremost a human rights issue.

The Gospel of Life provides a blueprint for building a culture of life and civilization of love. The important work of transforming our culture begins by allowing the Gospel of Christ to touch and transform our own hearts and the decisions we make. May we strive to imitate Christ and follow in his footsteps, caring for the most vulnerable among us. Through the intercession of Our Lady of Guadalupe, may Our Lord grant us the grace to live courageously and faithfully his Gospel of life.

BAPTISMS

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

IF YOU ARE HOSPITALIZED...




