

Blessed Father McGivney: Knights of Columbus founder beatified

Father Michael McGivney, the young parish priest who founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882, joined the ranks of the blessed Saturday during a beatification Mass at St. Joseph Cathedral in Hartford, Connecticut.

Reading an apostolic letter in Latin from Pope Francis, Cardinal Joseph Tobin of Newark, New Jersey — the pope's representative for the liturgy — announced that Blessed Michael McGivney, "whose zeal for the proclamation of the Gospel and generous concern for the needs of his brothers and sisters made him an outstanding witness of Christian solidarity and fraternal assistance," will have his feast day on Aug. 13.

"He worked to keep families united in dignity and security," Cardinal Tobin later said during his homily, in which he described the humble 19th-century priest as an apostle who cared for victims of an epidemic that would eventually claim his own life just two days after his 38th birthday.

Said Cardinal Tobin, "130 years after his death, the brief life of this holy man speaks eloquently to our own path of holiness."

Michael McGivney was born in 1852 to Irish immigrant parents in Waterbury, Connecticut. Ordained in 1877, Father McGivney served as a parish priest ministering primarily to an Irish-American and immigrant community in the then-Diocese of Hartford.


While serving as pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Father McGivney and a group of leading Catholic men founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882 to provide spiritual support for Catholic men and financial resources for families that suffered the loss of their breadwinner.

His working-class parishioners, whose often difficult lives Father McGivney personally accompanied, described him as a living "positive" saint, Carl Anderson, the supreme knight of the Knights of Columbus, said in presenting a brief biography of Father McGivney's life.

Anderson noted the encouraging remarks that Pope Francis and his two predecessors have said about Father McGivney and his embodiment of the Knights' virtues of charity, unity and fraternity.

"To this day, Father McGivney's holiness of life and exemplary service continue to inspire priests across America and around the world, and his vision for an active and engaged laity serves as a witness to the power of spiritual brotherhood and charity," Anderson said.

The Vatican announced on May 27 that Pope Francis had approved a decree recognizing a miracle attributed to Father McGivney's intercession, paving the way to his beatification. The miracle involved the healing of Michael Schachle, a Tennessee boy, now 5 years old, from a fatal case of fetal hydrops.



Michael's parents and several of his 12 brothers and sisters attended Saturday's liturgy, in which they presented a first-class relic of Blessed Father McGivney.

"It's absolutely surreal," Daniel Schachle, the father of young Michael and himself a fourth-degree Knight of Columbus, told reporters after the Mass.

Father McGivney is the third U.S.-born priest to be beatified, after Blesseds Stanley Rother and Solanus Casey, both of whom were beatified in 2017. The Archdiocese of Hartford opened Father McGivney's cause for beatification and canonization in 1997.

"I believe Father McGivney is truly Pope Francis' kind of priest, a model in his time of closeness to Christ's sheep on the peripheries of life and of society," Archbishop Leonard P. Blair of Harford said in reading a letter of appreciation to the Holy Father.

In his homily, Cardinal Tobin told an audience of about 200 people — the 1,500-seat cathedral's capacity was limited by COVID-19 public health protocols — that in Father McGivney "we see the face of a son of immigrants who gave his life in pastoral service of those most recently arrived in this country."

Said Cardinal Tobin, "Father McGivney's life is an illustration of how a holy priest can provide that necessary and intimate connection so necessary in the life and mission of a parish."

Cardinals Timothy Dolan of New York and Seán O'Malley of Boston co-celebrated the Eucharistic liturgy with Cardinal Tobin, who said Father McGivney was sanctified "by doing what parish priests still do, day in and day out."

In his closing remarks, Anderson, the supreme knight, said it was providential that Father McGivney's beatification occurred in the same month that *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis' new social encyclical on human fraternity, was published. In the encyclical, Anderson noted, the Holy Father writes that each day "we have to decide whether to be good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders."

"We know the decision Blessed Michael McGivney made, and we know the decisions that millions of his brother knights have made following his example," Anderson said. "Inspired by that example, let us go forward with renewed spirit of charity so we too can be a blessing to all those we meet."



November: A Month to Honor the Dead Purgatory

A Dogma of the Catholic Faith

First, it may be a good idea to know what a dogma is: Simply put, a Dogma is a definitive teaching of the Catholic Church, a teaching revealed by God through Scripture and Tradition, a teaching that must be accepted by all believers if they are to continue to consider themselves as "good" or "faithful" Catholics. The Dogmas of the faith are not open to debate, and are not subject to our approval. They are the truths of the faith. It is an error to

think that Vatican II did away with Purgatory. There is a Heaven, a Hell, and a Purgatory, and all three places are a distinct possibility for all of us. So, **what is Purgatory**? It is the state or condition of cleansing for one who dies in God's friendship, or in a state of grace, but who still has sins or temporal punishment for which to atone. Neither the nature nor the duration of Purgatory is specified in Catholic Doctrine; however, the existence of Purgatory is a dogma of the faith. The faithful are encouraged to assist the "Poor Souls in Purgatory" by their prayers and penances. For more information on Purgatory, see the Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1030-32.

Often, family and friends of the dead act out of a lack of knowledge or consideration of Purgatory. While families may hope and pray for a loved one's salvation it is wrong to assume they're automatically in Heaven. That erroneous presumption implies that prayer and sacrifice are not necessary, and that the judgment of God is non-existent. The truth is, most people need to be purified of selflove in Purgatory even if their ultimate destination is Heaven. Purgatory is not only a reflection of the justice of God, but also the mercy of God. This is why we have Masses for the dead. Although, many Catholics are abandoning this beautiful spiritual practice, preferring instead to "secularize" the burying of their dead. In a misguided attempt to "ease the pain" of death, people are increasingly abandoning religious funerals for events that focus on this life and not the next. According to a USA Today story, funerals increasingly are turning away from being serious occasions of mourning and prayer for the repose of the soul of the deceased. Instead, many funerals are becoming "life celebrations" that emphasize the favorite hobbies or possessions of the deceased. Sadly, it's common to see beer bottles, golf clubs, cigarettes, photos, athletic caps, and other trinkets placed inside and around the caskets of the dead. For the devout Catholic Christian, such "trappings of this life" are out of place near the body of the deceased... they bespeak of a belief that we carry the "goods" of this life into the next [a rather pagan notion]. This trend has increased as society has become more secularized. But it's a trend that can be reversed by informing the faithful of the spiritual merits of honoring someone's passing in to eternal life. In other words, we have to remember what we're doing and what we're about when we bury our dead. There is a marginalization of religion, in society, as people are opting for spirituality without doctrine over faith and don't understand eschatological realities. The Order for Christian Funerals indicates that when the body is brought in, they can have a crucifix, a Bible or the Rosary in their hands. Perhaps it's best to leave the other trinkets for memorial displays at home, the memorial luncheon, or at the funeral home away from the casket. We're not looking for the "happy hunting grounds," or like an Egyptian Pharaoh, looking for continuing the good life of earth in the afterlife. With the secularization of society, a certain sense of Christian decorum and dignity is being lost, and needs to be reclaimed. At the Catholic Funeral, we honor the bodies of the dead, who were "temples of the Holy Spirit" through Baptism into the Lord Jesus. When examined closely, Catholic funeral rites are beautiful services where moments have significant meaning. The more secular "life celebration" type of funerals lack the necessary Catholic spiritual dimension, a hope in Heaven and the resurrection of the dead. Catholics need to be informed regarding the proper means to memorialize loved ones. Narcissism is at the root of self-worship, and the temptation is there to drown in their own selfworship, especially when grief and other emotions are running high. When a beloved one dies, a family with no religious roots still wants to secure some kind of immortality for this person, so they put in their favorite games or food, as if they are going to be playing and snacking in the next world. It's for the Church to proclaim our faith in Jesus crucified and risen from the dead. The Church has entered a struggle to maintain the deeply spiritual dimension of our lives in Christ. It is difficult when the families we minister to lack the spiritual depth necessary to bury their dead as Catholics. Some families are willfully opposed to any type of religious service, despite their loved one's wishes. Therefore, priests encourage people to put in their will that they want a funeral celebrated according to the rites and practices of the Catholic Church. The Catholic Christian attitude toward death, funerals, and burial is sober but not somber. Funerals are a profoundly solemn occasion for facing the raw facts of the human condition, while the funeral liturgy itself is centered on the Paschal mystery of Jesus Christ [His Passion, Death, and Resurrection].

Eulogies are more properly given at the wake service or memorial luncheon. Whenever the Church gathers to celebrate the Eucharist, the focus is always on Jesus, on His Paschal Mystery, not ourselves. When faith is present, the focus is easily maintained. When faith is lacking or being "resisted" people try to put onto the liturgy things not proper to it... namely, secular "trappings" inappropriate to the worship of God. Nonetheless, in Her ministry to the grieving community, and in Her obligations toward the dead, the Church seeks to remain authentic to the Faith Christ has given us, even when it is at odds with a secular world.



BAPTISMS

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

If you or someone you know is in need of this Sacrament, please contact the Parish Center at any time. Upon admission to the hospital, please make it known you.

IF YOU ARE HOSPITALIZED...

If you or a family member are admitted to the hospital, please contact the Parish Center to let us know. 
