Fourth Sunday of Advent

From the Pastor



Dear Parish Family:

The Gospel reading today recounts the story of the Annunciation of the Birth of Jesus to the Blessed Virgin Mary (*Luke 1:26-38*). The story tells of an intimate conversation between Mary and the Angel Gabriel, when a young woman says “yes” to God. It’s easy to forget that the Virgin Mary was a young Jewish girl, probably in her early teens, who, we’re told, is “troubled” by the angel’s appearance – and by his greeting: *Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you... You have found favor with God... you will conceive and bear a son.*

Yet, to this disturbing announcement of the angel, Mary says, “May it be done to me according to your word.” Those few words carry within them great meaning. With those words, something in the universe shifted gear. The long reign of sin and death is coming to an end.

This moment, this EVENT of the Annunciation of the birth of Jesus to the Virgin, is incredibly significant. So significant is the conception of Jesus within the womb of Mary, that the Church celebrates it each year, nine months before Christmas... March 25th is observed as the Feast of the Annunciation. This moment is so important that it’s remembered each Sunday... it’s put before us in a dramatic way every time we recite the Nicene Creed at Mass. *At the words that follow, up to and including “and became man,” we are to bow...* On Christmas, we’ll kneel at those words. But why?... Because they recall that singular moment in all of history, in all of the Universe, when GOD BECAME MAN... and took on our human flesh, becoming like us in all things, but sin. Think about it – it really is an INCREDIBLE MOMENT! And so, for centuries, the Church instructs us to BOW our heads in recognition of this moment when something in the universe shifted gear. Salvation had come!

And by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man: It’s only two lines in the Creed, it passes quickly. Often without notice. One gentleman once told me that he doesn’t bow his head, and noticed that others don’t either.... saying, “the line comes and goes so quick in the Creed, and besides, it’s uncomfortable, it feels odd to do, it doesn’t seem natural.” I guess that’s true. Humility and Awe in God’s presence doesn’t come naturally – they are virtues, paths to holiness, that we have to practice and cultivate in our lives. Bowing our heads, showing reverence, is yet another way to get our WHOLE body, our WHOLE self involved in our prayer... it helps us focus our effort, on what we are professing.

So today, when we recite the Creed, let’s all make the effort to follow the liturgy with a “lively faith.” And not only today, let’s remember today’s Gospel EVERY TIME we pray the Creed, and let’s be more aware of the mystery we proclaim. Hopefully, then, being drawn more and more into the liturgy, we will grow all the more in holiness, in our closeness to God.

The story of the Annunciation reminds us of that nearness of God. When Mary said... May it be done to me according to your word... those words not only changed her life, but also the life of the world. That “nearness” of God is so important, so necessary that over the centuries people have tried to become more and more aware of the presence of the Lord in our lives. On these days before Christmas, pray the Hail Mary very devoutly. Salute with great honor Our Lady with as much reverence as did the Angel Gabriel. And while you sit before the Nativity this Christmas meditate on Mary’s humility, and on the love of the Son of God who became Man for love of us.

May the Blessed Mother lead us closer to Her Son. Merry and holy Christmas to all!

In just a few days, Christmas will be here. Today, as we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Advent, I invite you to continue your preparation for the great feast to come. Prepare your heart, as well as your home for the feast of Christmas.

Late Advent Confessions will be heard as follows:

- This weekend on Sunday following the 11:30 am Mass until all are heard
- This Tuesday, December 22, at 7:00 pm until all are heard
- This Wednesday, December 23, at 8:30 am until all are heard

These are the last scheduled Confessions before Christmas. Confessions resume Saturday, January 2 at 4:15 pm.

Especially as the rush of the season unfolds, it's important to take a few minutes of quiet time, alone, to ponder the great mystery of the Word of God becoming flesh! Taking stock of our lives and making a good confession of our sins is not only a wonderful way to prepare to receive the real blessings of Christmas, but also think how happy the Lord will be! What a wonderful gift to give Him for Christmas!

If you have been away from the Sacrament of Reconciliation for a while, I encourage you to receive the sacrament. The Lord is always waiting for you with great love, great mercy, and great forgiveness. Likewise, I encourage you, throughout the coming Christmas Season, to stop in Church this week during the daylight hours and to spend some time in quiet prayer with the Lord, really and truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. The church will be open for private prayer from 6:00am until 6:00pm each day this week before Christmas.

Jesus is waiting for you. Keep him at the center of your Christmas celebrations, and you'll see that you'll have the best Christmas ever!



2021 Parish Calendars...

2021 Catholic Calendars will be provided again this year. However, due to publishing delays, calendars are late in delivery this year. Thank you for your patience.

It is hard to believe we are already in Advent and Religious Ed is on Christmas break. RE got off to a great start with about 2/3 of our families opting for in-person classes and 1/3 choosing remote learning. At this writing, all classes are remote until the end of January. This is to ensure the safety of all our families, catechists, and staff throughout and after the holiday season.

Our families and Catechists are doing a marvelous job sharing the Catholic faith with the children of St. Peter. Seventh and eighth grades are preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation and I was able to reschedule the Confirmation Retreat to a virtual event given by Net Ministries. Many of you may remember the Net team being at St. Peter's in prior years. They are a group of post college students on fire with the love of God and our Catholic faith who travel from parish to parish. They stay at the homes of parish families and I have been told the families who receive them are very blessed indeed.

Second graders are preparing for First Reconciliation at the end of January and Holy Communion in May. We do not know at this time when we will have Confirmation. Hopefully, we will have a better idea after the first of the year. We also have one student who will be received into the Catholic Church during the Easter Vigil in 2021. Please pray for all our children preparing for the Sacraments. Other classes are learning to pray with scripture, the Bible timeline, and all about the Holy Mass.

Wednesday and Saturday classes were blessed and delighted to have Fr. Noesen stop by and answer questions from students. He is going to do the same for our remote learning classes. Father also got us off to a good start by professionally cleaning the school to Covid standards, blessing all of our books and a photo of the Divine Mercy that many have put on front doors to keep families safe while trusting in Jesus and His mercy.

We also recently had internet installed at the school with the help of a Catholic Education Foundation Grant and the generosity of Religious Ed parents. This allows catechists to Zoom classes from the school and tap into online resources.

We are grateful to God for all the many gifts he has given to us. Faithful and dedicated catechists, parents who do everything they can to help their children participate in Religious Ed, Fr. Noesen's flexibility and willingness to participate in our program, and the engagement of all the children learning more about their faith. We are grateful for Zoom and to be able to see and interact with each other until we can meet again.

We are especially grateful to all of our families who have brought us into their homes and the many siblings and family pets we have met while parents stand by as IT professionals at-the-ready to fix any glitches while listening in on our classes.

We are also grateful to all of you who support our Religious Education program. We are so blessed to be a part of the wonderful St. Peter's family.

The First Christmas Creche...

Saint Francis of Assisi called it a “creche,” the French word for cradle. He spoke fluent French, and at his time, among the aristocracy, it was popular to use it. Francis created the first creche using real people, a real manger, a real OX and ass, and real shepherds. The Incarnation, Christmas, was a key component in the spirituality of St. Francis. He wanted to celebrate the Incarnation in a special way. He wanted to do something that would help people remember the Christ Child and how He was born in Bethlehem. Francis wanted people to see and experience how He lay in a manger with an ox and an ass standing by — how He lay upon the hay where He had been placed. The Incarnation, Christmas, was a key component in the spirituality of St. Francis. He wanted to celebrate the Incarnation in a special way. He wanted to do something that would help people remember the Christ Child and how He was born in Bethlehem. Francis wanted people to see and experience how He lay in a manger with an ox and an ass standing by — how He lay upon the hay where He had been placed. It was Christmas Eve in the year 1223. At the appointed time, Franciscan Brothers came to the “new Bethlehem” [a cave on a mountain in Greccio, Italy]. Men, women, and children from the area also came to celebrate. The torches they carried lit up the night as they approached the creche. Once again shepherds were walking in the night to come and adore Him. All were filled with joy over the mystery of the Incarnation. And a great tradition began.



As you gaze upon the Christmas Nativity scene, may you remember and celebrate again God's love for His creation. To show His abundant love, mercy, and forgiveness, He became a person like us. This is what the creche symbolizes. The night-time darkness had fled! The woodland clearing on a mountain near the small Italian village of Greccio was made bright as day with torchlight. The villagers cried out in surprise and awe as they beheld the Christmas Eve gift of St. Francis of Assisi. The chanting of the Franciscan Brothers echoed through the rocky hills as St. Francis stood in front of the manger. Overcome with tenderness, he watched as the villagers saw and felt the cold and poverty of the humble birthplace of the Little Brother of all Mankind. Then with a wondrous joy, St. Francis read aloud from the Holy Gospel. Those witnessing the scene saw Francis pick-up the figure of the Baby Jesus, which had turned, miraculously into a radiant, smiling, little child. He appeared to converse with the Baby Jesus. Since that deeply stirring night near Greccio, the Christmas creche has become a part of the world's Christmas celebration. And whether as a living dramatization, a large Nativity scene, or carved miniatures, it brings happiness to the hearts of adult and child alike. Gazing upon the creche with reverence brings us always closer to the two thousand year old, but ever new, Christmas Mystery.



Mary in Advent

The Blessed Mother bears many titles: Theotokos (“Godbearer”), Mother of God, Star of the Sea, Immaculate Conception, Queen of Heaven, Seat of Wisdom, and many more. All of them honor her in different ways and help us to appreciate more fully her role in the life of her Son, her rightful place in the Church and the reasons for loving and venerating her. Catholics, of course, do not worship Mary and never have, despite the erroneous claims of many Protestants and evangelicals to the contrary. Surprisingly, Martin Luther had a strong Marian devotion and called her the “highest woman and the noblest gem in Christianity after Christ.... She is nobility, wisdom, and holiness personified. We can never honor her enough” (Sermon, Christmas 1531). Sadly, the church which he founded and bears his name has, over the centuries, lost that affection and devotion for the Mother of our Savior. It is in the Scriptures that we can so appreciate especially the place of the Blessed Mother in salvation history, which means that we see her not just in the New Testament, but in the Old Testament as well. As the Second Vatican Council taught, these earliest documents, as they are read in the Church and are understood in the light of a further and full revelation, bring the figure of the woman, Mother of the Redeemer, into a gradually clearer light (Lumen Gentium, Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, #55).

As we journey through Advent and prepare ourselves for the Christmas season, the Virgin Mary in the Old Testament is revealed especially. Take just one example in Isaiah: “Therefore, the Lord himself will give you a sign: the young woman, pregnant and about to bear a son, shall name him Emmanuel” (7:14; see also Mi 5:2-3; Mt 1:22-23). In seeing Mary in the Old Testament, we appreciate those books as well. St. Augustine said, “The New Testament is hidden in the Old, and the Old is made manifest in the New.” Which is why finding Mary in the Old Testament permits us to see her Son even more clearly and to emulate her as disciples, she who is the first and greatest of the disciples. Vatican II memorably wrote: “The Blessed Virgin was on this earth the virgin Mother of the Redeemer, and above all others and in a singular way the generous associate and humble handmaid of the Lord” (Lumen Gentium, #61).

“Peace in the Womb” Christmas Caroling

There are THREE opportunities to share the same good news that the angel proclaimed over 2000 years ago. The angels shared the good news with shepherds in the fields. We seek to share it with disillusioned and desperate men and women at an abortion clinic on Irving Park Road in Wood Dale. They do not need to be afraid. 

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Please read the **baptism planning information** provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided **by each godparent.** The proper **sponsor certificate** for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.
