From the Pastor

Dear Parish family,

This week, the readings begin a series of summertime reflections on the Eucharist which will stretch out over the next few weeks. We'll be hearing from the sixth chapter of Saint John's Gospel, known as the BREAD OF LIFE DISCOURSE. It gives us Christ's teaching on the Eucharist. This rather long chapter in Saint John's Gospel all begins with the story of the miracle of the feeding of the five thousand. Like the multitudes gathered on the grass before Jesus in the Gospel, we're invited to listen to Him teach us about the Bread of Life, and to receive this Heavenly Food with a renewed awareness of this wonderful Sacrament -- because it is truly the BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST!


In the Gospel today, the Disciples gather what they have [five loaves and two fish] to present to Jesus... just as we gather our gifts of bread and wine and monetary offerings for the needs of the Church. Jesus then pronounces the blessing, and from what little the disciples think they have, He produces an abundance. So much so, that there are twelve full baskets leftover.


This miracle story teaches us one of the profound truths about the Eucharist: If we trust and give every thing we have to the Lord -- what little we may think we have, what little we may think we are -- if we give it all to the Lord, He will produce such an abundance of grace, such an abundance of blessings. His presence in our lives will be more than we could ever imagine to strengthen our faith. The presence of the Lord in our lives will give us the courage and wisdom to live a life of holiness, so that, if we are faithful to Him, we will eventually inherit the promise of Heaven.

The "Miracle of the Feeding of the Five Thousand" is about the graciousness and abundance of God, it's not about getting what we deserve, but about getting more that we could ever deserve, or hope for.



Satan Recognizes Christ's Body. DO WE?

Recent studies suggest that many Catholics do not believe that the Eucharist is the Body of Christ.

But there is someone who has no doubt about it—Satan.

He knows that what looks like bread on Catholic altars and in tabernacles is really the Body of his Crucified and Risen Vanquisher, Jesus Christ. He knows that in this sacrament, Christ unites his faithful to himself. He knows the Eucharist is food for our journey to heaven. He knows that the Body of Christ binds the Church in love, making her triumph over the gates of hell. And he hates it.

So Satan battles against the Eucharist with all the foolish might with which he fought God's angels when he first rebelled. He persecutes the Eucharist with the envy and anger with which he went after Christ in the temptations and the Passion.

The Enemy usually does battle by spreading lies about the Eucharist—"It's *just* a symbol"; "Anyone can receive Communion any which way"; "Missed Mass? No big deal . . . God understands"; "It's useless to sit and pray an hour before a piece of bread." The devil is thrilled by our doubts, our disbelief, our irreverence, and our negligence toward the Eucharist. He loves to deprive us of the riches of the sacrament.

But Satan sees Christ patiently waiting for us to worship and receive his Body. He sees Jesus quietly turning hearts back toward him, bringing Catholics back to Confession and Communion, adding believers to the Church. He sees the Church—her saints and her sinners—offering Holy Mass daily, praying by tabernacles, adoring her Eucharistic Lord. He sees that the Real Presence extends the victory of the Cross.

This infuriates him and sometimes he lashes out violently. Up and down the history of the Church and even today, the devil inspires some wretched sinners to do violence to the Blessed Sacrament. These horrible acts display in human hearts Satan's hatred for God and for God's Church.

An anecdote from Catherine Doherty brought these truths home to me. In the late 1930s, Catherine was sent to Europe as a journalist for a Catholic paper, assigned to report on the state of the Church. One of her stops was Spain, then in the midst of its fratricidal civil war. She and an Irish-American correspondent visited a town the Falangists had just recaptured from the communists. Catherine writes:

"In Brunette I encountered absolute horror. In the first church we entered, we saw a large ciborium on the altar in which consecrated hosts were inserted in feces. My friend exploded! With his handkerchief he removed the hard feces and put the ciborium back into the tabernacle. He was a Catholic, and he wept like a baby beside the desecrated altar. His face was just covered with tears. I couldn't cry because I was beyond crying." (Fragments of my Life)

Upon leaving the church, Catherine and her companion saw two other horrors. They first came to a cemetery where the corpses of deceased Carmelite friars and nuns were disinterred and desecrated in unspeakable ways. Then they visited a hospital where they saw a

young Carmelite nun dying after having been horribly violated by communist soldiers. Catherine's descriptions of these scenes are too graphic to include in this piece. But one sentence captures her experiences: "It was a kind of surrealistic hell, and it remains etched forever in my mind" (*Fragments of My Life*, 123).

Catherine and her friend encountered Satan's wicked anger toward Christ in the Eucharist and toward those consecrated to adore and serve him. Overwhelmed by sorrow, they prayed for those sinners who had been the devil's pawns in these blasphemous attacks. These events stayed with Catherine as an image of the devil's war on the true Body of Christ in the Eucharist and his Mystical Body, the Church.

Reflecting on the devil's hatred for the Body of Christ, we should pray for a deeper faith in it. If Satan hates this sacrament so much, God must work great good through it. We should sorrow, pray, and do penance for those who don't know Christ's presence in this Sacrament, who ignore or ridicule or even attack it. Above all, we should let ourselves be drawn to the love of the Crucified and risen Christ present in the Eucharist. For no matter what the devil thinks he can do against Christ's Body, nothing will separate us from the love of Christ.

On the bewildering fear of Eucharistic consistency

In recent weeks and months, the phrase "Eucharistic coherence" or "Eucharistic consistency" has risen almost to common parlance in Catholic circles and in Catholic media. The phrase has most frequently been connected to a forthcoming document — recently approved for drafting by 75% of the U.S. bishops — centered on "the meaning of the Eucharist in the life of the Church."

The outline of the document, as presented by Bishop Kevin C. Rhoades, chair of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Doctrine (and, full disclosure, chair of the OSV Board of Directors), includes the "fundamental truths" of what the Church teaches on the Eucharist, the "need to celebrate the sacrament with reverence and beauty," and how participation in the Eucharist "compels us to conversion and sends us out to be missionary disciples."

This third point has, strangely, been the cause of much consternation almost from the first moments of the bishops' June 16-18 gathering — not to mention for months ahead of time — because it will include a section on "Eucharistic consistency." It's hard to comprehend that a group of leaders within the Catholic Church — even a minority group — would launch such a strong objection to emphasizing that Catholics should strive to live what they believe. Yet this is what has happened.

Though it has its foundation in Canons 915 and 916 of the Code of Canon Law, the phrase "Eucharistic consistency" can best be traced back to the 2005 Synod of Bishops on the Eucharist, a gathering that closed out the Year of the Eucharist initiated by Pope John Paul II in 2004. As part of the usual synod process, a *lineamenta* was compiled — a document that encourages the input of all Catholics regarding the topic at hand. Through that feedback, the synod fathers gleaned several key takeaways, which were described in the synod's working document as "indications of deep-rooted attitudes."

These attitudes included a sense that Mass participation on Sundays and holy days of obligation was decreasing "due to a lack of understanding on the content and meaning of the Eucharistic mystery and to an attitude of indifference." They also indicated that "a sense of the sacred" regarding the Eucharist has been weakened due to a "neglect of prayer, contemplation and adoration of the Eucharistic mystery" — all of which threatens faith in Jesus' real presence. And, significantly for the current conversation, the feedback pointed to the reality that "people are not always consistent in the faith they profess in the Sacrament and the moral implications of the Sacrament in both personal matters as well as in the general cultural and social arena."

In his post-synodal apostolic exhortation *Sacramentum Caritatis*, published a year and a half after the Synod on the Eucharist, Pope Benedict XVI expanded on that problem of Eucharistic consistency, specifically in light of those people who occupy roles of influence. "Worship pleasing to God can never be a purely private matter, without consequences for our relationships with others: it demands a public witness to our faith," he wrote. "Evidently, this is true for all the baptized, yet it is especially incumbent upon those who, by virtue of their social or political position, must make decisions regarding fundamental values, such as respect for human life, its defence from conception to natural death, the family built upon marriage between a man and a woman, the freedom to educate one's children and the promotion of the common good in all its forms. These values are not negotiable."

In its attempt to draft a statement on the Eucharist, including a section on Eucharistic consistency, the doctrine committee has been accused of targeting Catholic U.S. President Joe Biden in order to justify denying him holy Communion. But such a statement can only serve to reiterate Church teaching — not invent it. As with any other organization, it is the teaching and the expectation of the Church that those who profess to be her members live according to her beliefs in a consistent manner. When we inevitably fail, the Sacrament of Reconciliation is there to return us to a state of grace and assist us "to sin no more and to avoid whatever leads (us) to sin." There is an expectation that we be willing to amend our behavior and strive to live in accordance with what the Church teaches. This seems a reasonable expectation. And it's absolutely essential, as Father Harrison Ayre recently wrote, in order to preserve the unity of the Church and to advance her mission in the world.

There are those who claim that to follow or to enforce this discipline of the Church is to make a weapon of the Eucharist. But the Eucharist is not a weapon. It is a gift freely given to us by our loving and merciful God, and we receive it on his terms, not our own. Though we are never truly worthy of receiving it, the Church teaches that we are at the very least to make sure that we are properly disposed to do so. Only in this way can we truly, and correctly, live what we believe. What is there to fear about that?

The Eucharistic Miracle of Siena

In 2009 a catalogue was published of Eucharistic Miracles, inspired by a Vatican International Exhibition that described 152 Eucharistic Miracles throughout the world. Neither the catalogue nor the exhibition made claims to have listed all of them (source). A Eucharistic Miracle in Siena is just one example. In 1730 thieves broke into the church of St. Francesco in Siena and stole a chalice containing 351 consecrated hosts (source).

Three days later the hosts were found intact in an alms box in the sanctuary of Santa Maria in Provengano, and there was a celebration and procession with the hosts back to the church of San Francesco. Even the Eucharist, although now Our Lord, deteriorates like bread over time if not consumed. These 351 hosts to date have not deteriorated, and actually appear as fresh as the day they were consecrated, being tested as recently as 1922.

Our Lord in those miraculous consecrated hosts is still adored and revered in Siena today, just as he is in every celebration of the Eucharist.



BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information. Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDING:

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.

Additionally, before being admitted to a hospital for surgery, it is advisable to call Fr. Noesen to arrange to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Please contact the Parish Center at 630-773-1272 (ext. 200) to arrange for communion visits to the homebound.
