# From the **Pastor**

#### Dear Parish family,

Last April, Deacon Bob Ziomek celebrated his 30th anniversary of ordination as a permanent Deacon; and last week, Deacon Fred Maier celebrated his 5th anniversary of ordination as a permanent deacon. I invite everyone to express their thanks to these men for the years of service given to our parish and the Diocese of Joliet. We are grateful to God for calling each of them to be stewards as deacons in the Church. If you wish to send cards and gifts to them, please send to the Parish Office.

God has been good to Saint Peter the Apostle Parish for sending us these fine men who serve in the name of the Lord. It's been wonderful having them serve with me at the altar and in various ministries for the people of God. I also want everyone to pray for Mr. Anthony George who is in his third year of studies

and formation for the permanent diaconate. He will be receiving the minor Order of Acolyte on October 9 at Saint Mary Parish in Mokena. This minor order is conferred upon men preparing for ordination to the diaconate, whether permanent or transitory. Transitory deacons seek ordination to the Order of Presbyter, or priesthood.

I know God is calling, but they have to answer the call. I think Saint John Paul II was correct when he said "There is no shortage of the call. God is calling. #### Special collection for Haiti recovery efforts Weekend of September 11-12

The people of Haiti have suffered greatly in recent days, as both an earthquake and tropical storm have struck the country located in the Caribbean Sea. Numerous lives have been lost, and many Church properties, along with homes and businesses, have been severely damaged or destroyed.

Catholic Relief Services is on the ground providing humanitarian aid, and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America has approved \$10,000 grants to each of the three most affected dioceses. But more help is needed.

In his role as USCCB president, Archbishop Gomez of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles has called for a voluntary, special collection to support the USCCB Bishops Emergency Disaster Fund to provide additional aid to Haiti. The Diocese of Joliet has set the weekend of September 11-12 for this special collection.

Thank you for your generosity and prayers for the people of Haiti.

In an effort to provide a more equitable opportunity for weekend mass requests, a new policy is in place limiting frequency of WEEKEND requests to ONE TIME PER MONTH with a cap of THREE intentions per request.

Currently, weekday mass intention requests will not be held to any restrictions.

Arrangements to have a Mass said for a particular intention can be made by visiting or calling the Parish Center during regular office hours.

Daily Masses and the Sunday 8:30 am and 10am Masses may have only one intention. The Saturday 5:00 pm Vigil and the Sunday 11:30 am Masses are generally available for multiple intentions with a maximum of six.

The requested stipend for a Mass intention is \$10.

Mass Intention Cards are available upon request.

*Note:* Certain weekend Mass times and dates are often requested months in advance.

This past spring, a Catholic Group called the Anointing Fire Catholic Ministries (AFCM) inquired about leasing of the former convent. AFCM is a Catholic evangelization community of priests, religious and lay missionaries working for the salvation of souls. Founded in a remote village in India by Rev Fr. Xavier Khan Vattayil, AFCM has grown to different parts of the world. Their vision is world evangelization through the spiritual renewal of families and catechism to young adults. The organization conducts retreats and conferences for priests, religious and lay people. Their communities are formed by group of families joined in prayer for evangelization. These communities with the blessing of their local bishop, and under the direction of spiritual director, work as per the inspirations received from the Holy Spirit. They also join hand-in-hand with other ministries within the Catholic Church to deliver the good news to all.

Our parish has leased the former convent for five years. In our negotiations, it was agreed upon that the building could also be used by the parish community, including, but not exclusive to the Knights of Columbus. The location will also serve as the office of Kingdom Revelator magazine, a Catholic publication for youth published by AFCM. In addition to the lease, AFCM committed many hours of work and spent their own money to clean up and renovate the building. They completed their renovation last month after several weeks of work and financial sacrifice on their part. The improvements include setting up of a prayer room, a conference room, and some office space. They also renovated the restrooms and some of the outside landscape. Some work is still ongoing. No monies from the parish were used. All of the monies came from AFCM, the Knights of Columbus and other generous contributors. AFCM, along with the Knights of Columbus, will use the building weekly. AFCM invites all parishioners to join them Sunday afternoons to pray with them the Rosary and to offer praise and thanksgiving to God. During this time, they also will share in reflections on the Word of God. All are welcome!

I am grateful to our new tenants and to the Knights of Columbus for their mutual hard work and sacrifice to renovate the building as this building has been sitting empty for over two years.

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated on September 8. This Feast is a celebration of the day on which she was born. Mary is traditionally believed to have been born in Jerusalem. #### Happy Birthday Blessed Mother!?

When was the Mother of God born? We can't know for certain, of course, but for almost 15 centuries now, the *Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary* has been celebrated on September 8. Those who are quick with math have already figured out that September 8 is exactly nine months after December 8--the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary.

In earlier centuries, the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary was celebrated with greater fanfare. Now, most Catholics probably don't even realize that the Church has a special feast day set aside to celebrate it. But, like the Immaculate Conception, the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary is an important date in our salvation history. Christ needed a mother, and Mary's own conception and birth, therefore, are events without which Christ's own birth would have been impossible.

It's no surprise, then, that the Christians of the second century A.D. recorded the details of Mary's birth in such documents as the Protoevangelium of James and the Gospel of the Nativity of Mary. While neither document bears the authority of Scripture, they provide us with everything that we know about the life of Mary before the Annunciation, including the names of Saint Mary's parents, Saint Joachim and Saint Anna (or Anne). It's a good example of Tradition, which complements (while never contradicting) Scripture.

#### Ephphatha: Be Opened!

**Reflection from Pope Benedict XVI** Catholic Online News International Europe

#### Dear brothers and sisters!

At the heart of today's Gospel (Mk 7, 31-37) there is a small but, very important word; a word that in its deepest meaning sums up the whole message and the whole work of Christ. The Evangelist Mark writes it in the same language that Jesus pronounced it in, so that it is even more alive to us. This word is "Ephphatha," which means, "be opened." Let us look at the context in which it is located.

Jesus was travelling through the region known as the "Decapolis", between the coast of Tyre and Sidon, and Galilee, therefore a non-Jewish area. They brought to him a deaf man, so that he could heal him - evidently his fame had spread that far. Jesus took him aside, touched his ears and tongue, and then, looking up to the heavens, with a deep sigh said, "Ephphatha," which means, "Be opened." And immediately the man began to hear and speak fluently (cf. Mk 7.35).

This then is the historical, literal, meaning of this word: this deaf mute, thanks to Jesus' intervention, "was opened", before he had been closed, insulated, it was very difficult for him to communicate, and his recovery was "openness" to others and the world, an openness that, starting from the organs of hearing and speech, involved all his person and his life: Finally he was able to communicate and thus relate in a new way. But we all know that closure of man, his isolation, does not solely depend on the sense organs. There is an inner closing, which covers the deepest core of the person, what the Bible calls the "heart". That is what Jesus came to "open" to liberate, to enable us to fully live our relationship with God and with others. That is why I said that this little word, "Ephphatha - Be opened," sums up Christ's entire mission.

He became man so that man, made inwardly deaf and dumb by sin, would become able to hear the voice of God, the voice of love speaking to his heart, and learn to speak in the language of love, to communicate with God and with others. It is for this reason, the word and the gesture of "Ephphatha" are included in the Rite of Baptism as one of the signs that explain its meaning.

The priest [or deacon] touching the mouth and ears of the newly baptized says: "Ephphatha" praying that they may soon hear the Word of God and profess the faith. Through Baptism, the human person begins, so to speak, to "breathe" the Holy Spirit, whom Jesus had invoked from Father with that deep breath, to heal the deaf and dumb man.

We now turn in prayer to Mary Most Holy, whose Nativity we celebrated yesterday. Because of her unique relationship with the Incarnate Word, Mary is fully "open" to the love of the Lord, her heart is constantly listening to his Word. May her maternal intercession help us to experience every day, in faith, the miracle of "Ephphatha," to live in communion with God and with others.

#### Ephphetha or Prayer over Ears and Mouth

The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the dumb speak. May he soon touch your ears to receive his word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father.

Amen.

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information. Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.
