FUNERAL MASS PLANNING

The Catholic wake, funeral Mass, and committal service set us on a path to true healing, wholeness, peace, and eternal life. Father Noesen, the parish staff, and parishioners at St. Peter the Apostle Parish are prepared to offer assistance as you face the death of a loved one. At the time of death, family members and friends often feel overwhelmed with the details related to the funeral. Know that we are ready to organize and provide for all of your funeral arrangements.

The first thing to do is contact the funeral home of your choice to begin making arrangements.

The funeral home staff will then contact the parish to coordinate the arrangements. Saint Peter the Apostle Church follows the Rite of Christian Burial. It is the responsibility of the parish to bury their dead. Funerals are on Mondays through Saturdays and are ordinarily celebrated at 10:00 am. According to Diocesan policy, if family members wish to offer eulogies, they should do so during the wake. The General Instruction for the Universal Church #382 states: "At the funeral Mass there should, as a rule, be a short homily, but never a eulogy." Please keep in mind that the Mass is the Mass, and a eulogy does not belong at that sacred time. Besides the wake, families have more appropriate places and opportunities to offer eulogies such as at the burial, and/or meal or gathering after the funeral. These times and places are more appropriate opportunities for family and friends to share what are mostly secular and personal remembrances of their loved one. Additionally, more time is then available for more than one presenter. Saint Peter the Apostle Parish will adhere to this instruction.

Below are opportunities for family and friends to participate in the Funeral Mass:

1. The family can place the PALL on the casket as it is brought into the church, a reminder of the deceased's baptism into Christ.
2. The family can choose the First Reading from the Old Testament (section C readings 1-7 in *Through Death to Life*). A family member or friend may read this scripture passage.
3. The family can choose the Second Reading from the New Testament (section E readings 1-15 in *Through Death to Life*). A family member or friend may read this scripture passage.
4. The family can choose a set of intercession (section H, sets 1-7 in *Through Death to Life*). A family member or friend may read these petitions and the prayers may be edited to include other specific names or concerns.
5. At the Preparation of Gifts, the family may bring up the offerings of bread and wine. This will require two people but can be more.
6. After communion, there is a pause for meditation. This time may be observed with a moment of silence, or an additional piece of sacred music.
7. The family can choose 5-6 pieces of sacred music to be played during the funeral mass. A list of most frequently chosen funeral music and the guidelines regarding funeral music are included below.

FUNERAL MUSIC

Because the "Funeral Mass" is a public act of worship of the church, the Rite of Christian Funerals dictates that we use sacred music for the funeral liturgy. Hymns should reflect our faith in God and the themes of resurrection and hope. An extensive list of most frequently requested funeral music is provided to the family for consideration. Any selection from our hymnal would also be appropriate. In the Dioceses of Joliet, and in keeping with the directives of the Rites, secular music is not allowed at funeral masses. Popular music can be played at the funeral home during the wake or at the wake prayer service. Most funeral homes have their own sound system available for their patrons.

The Liturgy/Music staff can assist in choosing music and placing your choices at appropriate spots in the funeral liturgy.
