

From the Pastor

Dear parish family,

Wednesday, June 29, is a very special day on the Church's calendar. We are privileged to celebrate the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul: Peter, the great leader of the faith, and Paul, its greatest defender. With this feast, the Church honors these holy apostles for the Christ-like way they lived their faith in the face of dire adversity. Saint Augustine said that this day is made holy by the passion of the blessed apostles Peter and Paul. We are, therefore, not talking about some obscure martyrs; for their voice and message has gone forth throughout the world. These martyrs realized what they taught. They pursued justice; they confessed the truth; they died for it!

It is upon the confession of faith made by Peter and the defense of the faith by Paul that the Church was built. Martyrs for the faith paid the highest price for their beliefs. With red vestments, the Church recognizes in a visual way the supreme witness to the faith given by the blood of the martyrs. The splendid red color shows us a wonderful paradox of our faith; it is in the blood of the martyrs that the Church is washed clean, purified, and made holy! It is in death that true life is found! The same Holy Spirit that filled the lives of Peter and Paul is at work in our lives guiding us to be witnesses to the truth. Can we be as open as they were to the movement of the Holy Spirit in our lives? Are we willing, like them, to give witness to Jesus in all we say and do? Their beautiful witness continues in the Church today.

Pope Francis is the head of the Church here on earth and successor of Peter the Apostle. The Holy Father continues as Christ's "vicar" — teaching, sanctifying, and governing in the place of Christ until he returns in glory. This Sunday, we are given the blessing of being able to support the ministry of the Holy Father in our gifts to the annual Peter's Pence collection -- the oldest "second" collection in the Church dating back to the Apostles themselves as described in the Acts of the **Apostles.** These funds, provided from dioceses around the world, support the administration of the universal Church and the works of the Holy Father in caring for those who suffer from poverty, war, or natural disasters. Through our contributions to the Peter's Pence collection, we share the concern of the successor of Peter for the many needs of the universal Church and for the relief of suffering persons around the globe. Please be generous in your gifts to the Peter's Pence collection. Pray for a strong and courageous witness to the truth and beauty of our Catholic Faith.

A brief training is provided. Two people are needed in the booth and shifts are scheduled for two hour increments.







Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflection - Gospel Reading: Saint Luke 9:51-62

Background on the Gospel Reading


Today's Gospel reading begins a long section unique to Luke's Gospel. Jesus begins his journey to Jerusalem, which will end with his ministry in Jerusalem. We read that Jesus' days for being "taken up" were fulfilled. The Greek word that Luke uses for "taken up" is the same word he uses to describe the Ascension. We also read that Jesus is determined to journey to Jerusalem. For Luke, Jesus ministry begins in Galilee and then is one long journey to Jerusalem. In Jerusalem he will meet his death but also enter into his glory. Only in Luke does Jesus then spend 40 days in Jerusalem instructing his disciples. It is in Jerusalem that his disciples wait after his Ascension to be sent the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. And it is from Jerusalem, in Luke's second volume, the Acts of the Apostles, that the Good News is spread to Rome and the ends of the earth.

Immediately Jesus is met with rejection, as a Samaritan village will not receive him because he is going to Jerusalem. There was animosity between Samaritans who worshiped on Mount Gerazim and Jews who worshiped in Jerusalem. Jesus was also rejected as he began his ministry in Galilee in Chapter 4. And he will be rejected for the last time when he reaches Jerusalem. James and John want to call down fire from heaven to destroy the people in the village, but Jesus rebukes them and moves on. There is often the temptation to use violence to achieve right. Jesus has come to break this temptation. He is aware that he must undergo violence himself before he can enter his glory.

The rest of today's reading is about the radical demands of discipleship. The three people who volunteer to become disciples on this journey show that they do not understand the demands Jesus will make of them. Neither care of self, care for the dead, nor care of one's family (as required by the Fourth Commandment) can come before the demands of discipleship. Jesus reminds the first volunteer, who would go wherever Jesus goes, that animals in the wild have more security than do Jesus and his followers. The second, who wants to bury a parent, is reminded that the demands of proclaiming the Kingdom of God take precedence. And the third, who wants to say farewell to his family, is reminded that once you put your hand to the plow you cannot look back or the furrow will be crooked. Such a person is not ready for the Kingdom of God.

Jesus seems harsh here, but he is only asking of his disciples what he asks of himself. Jesus' unconditional commitment to God's saving work will demand of him his life. He knows this, but the disciples do not understand. Jesus does not want anyone to rush into discipleship, because the demands of discipleship require everyone considering it to be aware of the cost, make Jesus and his mission central to his life, and then go forward without looking back.

Martyrs of Today

It is difficult to estimate how many men, women and children have been killed for their faith, but one respected researcher, Professor Todd Johnson, a Protestant expert on religious demography, has come up with the number of 70 million Christian martyrs since New Testament times. Two thousand years is a long time, and the number is plausible. What is surprising and frightening is that the same researcher estimates that over half of the martyrs, about 45 million Christians, were martyred in the last century, most of them victims of Nazi and Communist persecution. The killings continue into this century, with about 100,000 new martyrs each year. This means that 11 Christians have been killed every hour for the past 10 years, and the killings continue. The places where Christians are martyred now are mostly parts of Africa and of Asia: Congo, Sudan, Nigeria, India, Iraq, Syria.

Faced with opposition to the faith, one can either resist or dialogue or, as has happened frequently enough, abandon the faith, at least publicly. The tactic chosen will often depend on the nature of the adversary. The situation in China, for example, leaves Christians divided between the party of dialogue (members of the official government controlled church) and the party of resistance (members of the underground and imprisoned church). The two churches leave many confused and discouraged and, by default, allow the government to control all believers.

In the first centuries of Christianity, it was said that the blood of martyrs is the seed of Christians. The then pagans, worshipers of the official government gods of pagan mythology, were sometimes converted to the Christian faith, which is based upon revelation and reason and not on myth, because they had witnessed people go to their death rather than deny their faith in Christ. The pagans were also impressed by the way of life of the early Christians: see how they love one another. Anyone who has read the epistles of St. Paul knows that the early church was a contentious community, but there was a way of life that drew believers out of their own individual dreams and self-interest into a community of life and love. Catholic customs more clearly defined that way of life 50 years ago than they do today.

Fifty years ago, the Second Vatican Council called on Catholics to evangelize, to convert the world to Christ alive in his body, the church. For various reasons, that call was transformed and reduced into a concern for social action without direct witness to Christ. For some, the church became only an agency of assistance and aid to remedy the injustices of society. Gospel "values" replaced the Gospel itself. Pope Paul VI, recognizing the danger to the church's mission, wrote in 1975 that "even the finest witness will prove ineffective in the long run if ... the name, the teaching, the life, the promises, the kingdom and the mystery of Jesus of Nazareth, the Son of God, are not proclaimed."

If the church as a whole had responded to the council's call to evangelize 50 years ago, perhaps the call to a new evangelization would be less urgent today. In the kingdom of God, it is never too late, whether to forgive the church's persecutors or to convert the enemies of the faith. If we are to transmit the faith in order to transform the world, the first challenge is to ourselves: how do we become credible witnesses to Christ in today's world? We need help from martyrs, from their prayers and from their example.

A prayer for the new evangelization ends: God, our Father, I pray that through the Holy Spirit I might hear the call of the new evangelization to deepen my faith, grow in confidence to proclaim the Gospel and boldly witness to the saving grace of your Son, Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen."

Amen.



Adults interested in becoming Catholic or learning about the Catholic faith should contact the Parish Center for information.

BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.

Additionally, before being admitted to a hospital for surgery, it is advisable to call Fr. Noesen to arrange to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Please contact the Parish Center at 630-773-1272 (ext. 200) to arrange for communion visits to the homebound.

FUNERALS

It is the responsibility of the parish to bury their dead. The funeral director will contact the Parish Center regarding arrangements. Funerals are ordinarily celebrated at 10:00 am. For more information, please read guidelines for Funeral Planning on the parish website.



If it is too difficult for you to walk to the front of the church to receive Communion, please know that at each Mass an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion comes to the back of the church to distribute Communion. If you would like to have the Extraordinary Minister give you communion in the back of church, please let an usher know

before Mass begins. At Communion time, when you see the Extraordinary Minister come to the back, please raise your hand so that they can see you and give you Holy Communion.
