





From the Pastor

Dear Parish family,

Today we read in the Gospel of Saint Luke (5:1-11), Peter and His companions had labored all night and had caught nothing. All their work had been useless. They had done everything they could, but it was not enough. Something was missing. Then Jesus entered the picture, and everything changed. ONCE YOU LET THE LORD INTO YOUR LIFE, THINGS ARE NEVER THE SAME... that's the simple point of all the miracle stories of Jesus. Once the Lord entered the picture, Peter and his companions discovered the answer to their problems. They had been missing the most important ingredient of all: The help and the power of God. The Gospel contains an important lesson for all of us: Our human efforts are important, but they aren't enough... God must be a part of everything we do and are. The Apostles of Jesus were often amazed at his power and wisdom. Yet, at the same time, the Divinity of Jesus amazed them and made them aware of their sinfulness.

HE REALLY CAN DO ALL THINGS! Notice what happens, though... the Lord calls, but the disciples all respond to His call. We, too, must respond to the Lord's call... He doesn't do for us that which we can do for ourselves. He doesn't force Himself on us in any way... He does pursue us and offer us, again and again, SALVATION.


To accept the Lord's offer, we need to move beyond ourselves, beyond our sinfulness, to recognize our need for a savior and to accept the gift of salvation and forgiveness in the sacraments of the Church. It's not enough to listen to the Words of the Lord, we must act on His Word. In other words, like the disciples, we have to take him up on his offer of salvation -- to work as though everything depends on us, on our human efforts, but then, to pray as

though everything depends on God... because in the end, it does!

IRA Distributions

Individuals who are age 70 ½ or older can make transfers from their IRA directly to a charity, such as St. Peter the Apostle, and avoid paying income taxes on the distribution. Saint Joseph's Table



Why Encourage Your Son to Be a Priest?

We need physicians of the body for the well-being of our physical lives on earth. But, we also need physicians of the soul for the well-being of our souls destined for eternal life in Heaven with the Lord. As priest and author Stephen Rossetti said: The priest labors in the field of ultimate concern. Therein lies the inherent nobility of the priest: providing a critical service to others who would otherwise spiritually suffer and perish.

All of this is fine, you may say, but why my son? Sometimes such thoughts betray deeper fears:

Being cut off from your son, never having grandchildren, concern for his happiness, lack of social status for priests in today's world, and more. I'm losing my son: Parents of priests the world over will tell you — you don't lose a family member when your son joins the priesthood; you gain many more. This expanded family includes your son's fellow seminarians, who naturally welcome one another's parents. It also includes your home-parish community — where your son's vocation germinated — and the new parish or religious community where your son will be assigned. This community will embrace you along with your son, knowing his faith originated with you. Blessings abound when your son is a priest. A special bond exists between you that doesn't exist with your other children. The others are involved with their spouses and their own children, but you are always the special person in your son's life because you are his "earthly partners" on his priestly journey.

My son won't have children, and I want grandchildren.

There are different ways to experience paternity and a lack of a biological connection does not impede a paternal one. There is such a reality as "spiritual fatherhood." In this realm, everyone becomes his children... the priest becomes Father to all. Someday it will be their spiritual father who they will turn to, when they can't turn to their own parents for guidance and support.

What about financial security?

The sacrifices of a son who decides to become a priest touch his parents and often call for some sacrifice on their part. This could be letting go of professional aspirations for your son, hopes for grandchildren, and perhaps a financial safety net from the son who has given up all for God and the Church. That's why gifts to the priest, from appreciative members of the faithful, are so helpful and appreciated by priests. In a real way, they acknowledge and affirm the sacrifice the priest has made. But, as Saint Paul says... If we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's [Romans 14:8]. And so, yes, parents of a priest [and all of the faithful] are asked to share in a priest's sacrifice and be challenged to rise to an occasion of trusting faith. Encouraging your son to think prudently about his choice is one thing, but to resist it because it is not your will could reflect selfishness. This attitude goes against the trusting faith in God's will we espouse.

What if my son in unhappy and lonely?

Marriage is no guarantee for happiness, nor is it a cure for loneliness. Some parents worry their son will end up living with unhappy, burned-out priests. They believe the nature of the priesthood is to be on the receiving end of daily bad news. But a priest's motivation for his ministry is knowing he can be there for people and make a difference at the most difficult, distressing moments. He is also privileged to experience many often-underestimated, joyful moments. For the priest, being alone doesn't have to be lonely if you love what you do and remember for whose glory you do it. Heaven is our ultimate goal. Anyone who truly dedicates himself to God's work will be rewarded with eternal happiness. So if your son shows signs that he might want to follow this path, let your encouragement be a hundredfold.


Who would want to be a priest in today's culture?

Saint Paul tells us we are called to take on the mind and heart of Christ. Many young people looking at vocation today have taken him at his word. They hear Saint Paul's challenge to focus not on the things below, but on the things above. Disillusioned with the empty promises of a consumer culture, they opt to go deeper, to think higher, to reach further. They don't simply want something more — they want to be something more. Having a son who wants to be a priest may be uncomfortable because his journey suggests ideals different from societal norms. His values and vision of a meaningful life may conflict with his parents' notions of success. But our standard of success should be what Jesus taught and lived: What does GOD want of me? The most important thing in life is the salvation of our souls. Nothing should keep us from reaching that goal!

What about celibacy?

In a culture of radical individualism that promotes what I want, when I want it, the vocation of celibate priesthood is easily misunderstood. Celibacy is a way of loving compelled by the desire to imitate Christ. We are conditioned to grow-up and have a family. When a son doesn't follow that path, his parents wonder if he can be happy living an unmarried and celibate life. But we have to remember marriage and natural sexual expression for procreation and marital unity is only a medium for spiritual communion with God. Intimacy with Him is the goal of any vowed religious commitment. Reactions to celibacy are often rooted in misunderstanding and a different set of contemporary values, which are often at odds with the mind of Christ and His Church.

And so, why should YOU encourage your sons to become priests? Success is ultimately following your heart and being happy with your life. For us as Catholic Christians, that means putting on the heart and mind of Christ and being faithful to Him. Encouraging someone means inspiring a person with hope, courage, or confidence, building them up and giving support. This is at the heart of what parents do best. It is the duty of parents who recognize and perhaps have known the anguished spiritual cry for "a doctor in the house" to see that the house of God has physicians of the soul. How many parents, after watching their son celebrate the sacred Mass, receiving Communion from his hands and a blessing from his lips, could walk out of the church and say they wish he had chosen another profession? Could you? If you have never broached the topic of considering the priesthood with your son, ask yourself, "Why not?" ... and then, encourage your son, grandson, cousin, nephew, or friend to consider the possibility!

So, my hope for us all, is that we stay persistent, patient, peaceful, positive, and prayerful - even amidst the challenges.

The Message of Pope Francis for the 30th World Day of the Sick February 11, 2022

"Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful" (Lk 6:36

Standing beside those who suffer on a path of charity — the Message of Pope Francis for the XXX World Day of the Sick

"Jesus' invitation to be merciful like the Father" - writes the Pope - "has particular significance for healthcare workers.

I think of all those physicians, nurses, laboratory technicians, the support staff and the caretakers of the sick, as well as the numerous volunteers who donate their precious time to assist those who suffer. People who have made their service a mission. Because Your hands, which touch the suffering flesh of Christ, can be a sign of the merciful hands of the Father".

The Pontiff recalls "the progress that medical science has made, especially in recent times; new technologies have made it possible to prepare therapies that are of great benefit to the sick; research continues to make a valuable contribution to eliminating old and new pathologies; rehabilitation medicine has greatly expanded its expertise and skills. None of this, however, must make us forget the uniqueness of each patient, his or her dignity and frailties." However, he issues a warning and calls for the patient to always be treated as a person with his own dignity. "None of this, however, must make us forget the uniqueness of each patient, his or her dignity and frailties. Patients are always more important than their diseases, and for this reason, no therapeutic approach can prescind from listening to the patient, his or her history, anxieties and fears. Even when healing is not possible, care can always be given. It is always possible to console, it is always possible to make people sense a closeness that is more interested in the person than in his or her pathology."

The Holy Father reaffirms the importance of Catholic healthcare institutions and their commitment to caring for and treating people. "At a time in which the culture of waste is widespread and life is not always acknowledged as worthy of being welcomed and lived, these structures, like 'houses of mercy,' can be exemplary in protecting and caring for all life, even the most fragile, from its beginning until its natural end."

Finally, He concludes by recalling the indispensable service of the health care ministry, especially in spiritual assistance to the sick, and the commitment that each of us should have in making ourselves close to those who suffer. Because "the ministry of consolation is a task for every baptized person, mindful of the word of Jesus: 'I was sick and you visited me' (*Mt 25:36*)."



BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

HOSPITALIZATION NOTIFICATIONS AND SICK/HOMEBOUND ARRANGEMENTS

Due to hospital admitting policies, it is necessary to inform the Parish Center when hospitalized parishioners would like a visit from Fr. Noesen or a deacon. Likewise, please call if you would like a visit while convalescing at home or at a facility.

Additionally, before being admitted to a hospital for surgery, it is advisable to call Fr. Noesen to arrange to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Please contact the Parish Center at 630-773-1272 (ext. 200) to arrange for communion visits to the homebound.

FUNERALS

It is the responsibility of the parish to bury their dead. The funeral director will contact the Parish Center regarding arrangements. Funerals are ordinarily celebrated at 10:00 am. For more information, please read guidelines for Funeral Planning on the parish website.



If it is too difficult for you to walk to the front of the church to receive Communion, please know that at each Mass an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion comes to the back of the church to distribute Communion. If you would like to have the Extraordinary Minister give you communion in the back of church, please let an usher know

before Mass begins. At Communion time, when you see the Extraordinary Minister come to the back, please raise your hand so that they can see you and give you Holy Communion.
