





# From the Pastor


## Dear Parish family,


After forty days of appearing to His disciples and spoken to them of the Kingdom of God, Jesus appears for the last time. This we call the "Solemnity of the Ascension of Our Lord into Heaven." Jesus ascended to take his place at the Father's right hand. We profess these words every Sunday in the Profession of Faith, the Nicene Creed ~ "He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and His Kingdom will have no end." The Father has crowned His Son, Jesus the Christ, with the glory he merited by his Passion, Death, and Resurrection, and in turn, he is eternally asking the Father for each of us-by name-to receive the graces we need to join him one day in eternity and to help others get there too.

The Lord's Ascension is just as important for the Church as his Incarnation, Passion, Death, and Resurrection. Like the disciples in today's First Reading, we are awaiting the Lord's return in glory. In the meantime, He sends the Holy Spirit to His Church and on all the Baptized. He doesn't stop imparting His blessings and graces upon us. Once again we say this belief in the Profession of Faith, "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets." This Holy Spirit will come down upon the Church in a marvelous way on the Solemnity of Pentecost. Through the power of the Holy Spirit may we as Saint Peter the Apostle Parish continue to be made One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church together with all Catholics throughout the world.

## The Rite of Peace within Mass

"What happened with the Sign of Peace?"

To live and love our Catholic Faith, we have to know it!

The EXCHANGE OF PEACE by the congregation was done away with because of the pandemic as a matter of health and safety. However, a careful look at the liturgy shows that the familiar Sign of Peace is still there. The absence of the congregational "exchange of peace" actually provides the opportunity to grow in our knowledge of the liturgy, helping us understand the liturgy a bit better.

The ACTUAL "Sign of Peace" happens when the priest says, "the peace of the Lord be with you always" and the people respond, "and with your spirit." *THAT* is the Sign of Peace. Then the rubric says that the priest/deacon MAY - not MUST - MAY add "let us offer each other the sign of peace." And, because of the Coronavirus pandemic, the Bishops of the U.S. have rightly decided that, since the "exchange of peace" is optional, it is best to dispense with it for the time being. Although, with or without the pandemic, the "exchange of peace" is — and has always been — optional in the liturgy, left to the discretion of the celebrant. The fact is, the SIGN OF PEACE is given in every mass with the priest's invitation, "the peace of the Lord be with you always," and the people's response. The exchange is a different matter; and, right now because of the pandemic, for everyone's health and safety, it may not be shared among the congregants.

In July 2014, the Congregation for Divine Worship in Rome issued a directive regarding the Sign of Peace at Mass—

The congregation for worship noted that there are several abuses of the rite which are to be stopped: [1] The introduction of a "song of peace," which does not exist in the Roman Rite; [2] the faithful moving from their place to exchange the sign and waving across the church, turning around and creating a disturbance — thus taking attention away from the Altar; [3] the priest leaving the altar to exchange the sign with the faithful; especially when, [4] at occasions such as weddings or funerals, it becomes an occasion for congratulations or condolences, or "social moments."

The Sign of Peace, and the exchange of peace, it should be remembered are ritualized moments in the Mass. Being minor ritual actions, they should not detract from the worship of God. The letter reminded us that "the exchange of peace is optional and there certainly are times and places where it is not fitting. It is important that we moderate excesses, which create confusion in the liturgical assembly just prior to Communion and destroy the spirit of peace and reverence which should prevail throughout the liturgy, especially before the reception of Holy Communion."



## THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

Today we celebrate the great Solemnity of the Ascension of our Lord, that glorious moment when Jesus, 40 days after His resurrection, was lifted up — quite literally— into heaven, as the apostles watched in stunned amazement. It is recounted in both our first reading, from Acts, as well as the Gospel passage, from Mark. It must have been an extraordinary thing to witness.

But the first reading tells us that the apostles were not permitted to simply bask in the moment for very long. "While they were looking intently at the sky as he was going, suddenly two men dressed in white garments stood beside them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky?" In other words, "Don't just stand there, do something!"

This verse is a call to each one of us Christian stewards this very day. We have been given every grace and blessing through the Mass and all of the sacraments, through the Word of God, the rich teachings of our faith, and even our talents and our material possessions — so many gifts and blessings that we should live in a kind of stunned amazement ourselves.

And like those first apostles, we are not meant to just stand here, but to do something with these gifts — in love and gratitude to the One Who gave them to us. We are called, just as much as the first apostles "to be [His] witnesses... to the ends of the earth," not with our own

power, but through the power of the Holy Spirit in us.

Our second reading, from the Letter to the Ephesians, reminds us of the might and power of God whose witnesses we are. In fact, St. Paul describes "the surpassing greatness of His power." He reminds us that the Father raised Christ from the dead and has placed Him "far above every principality, authority, power, and dominion... not only in this age but also in the one to come." This is the mighty God we serve, the One Who has blessed us with every good thing, and the One Who now gives us the privilege of serving as His witnesses to the ends of the earth.

This God knows us, His children, so well. He knows that we are prone to fear and weakness just as the first apostles were. In the Gospel passage we read that they went to the mountain as the Lord instructed, and they saw Him there just as He promised. "When they saw him, they worshiped, but they doubted." The Lord was not angered by their doubt. Instead, He encouraged them with a reminder that "all power in heaven and on earth" had been given to Him. With that, He sent them on their way. "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations," He told them and He tells us today. And because He is so loving, He gives us one more powerful, comforting reminder — "I am with you always, until the end of the age."

On this feast of the Ascension, let us take a moment to "look up at the heavens" and ponder all the graces and blessings our loving God has given us. Then, let's do something! Let's put all those gifts to work as we serve as grateful witnesses to this amazing God.

## The Ascension

The Paschal Mystery culminates in the Ascension of Jesus. After his appearance here on earth in his risen body, and "after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen" (Acts 1:2), Jesus "was lifted up and a cloud took him from their sight" (Acts 1:9):

Christ's ascension marks the definitive entrance of Jesus' humanity into God's heavenly domain, whence he will come again (cf. Acts 1:11) ... Jesus Christ, the head of the Church, precedes us into the Father's glorious kingdom so that we, the members of his Body, may live in the hope of one day being with him forever. Jesus Christ, having entered the sanctuary of heaven once and for all, intercedes constantly for us as the mediator who assures us of the permanent outpouring of the Holy Spirit. (CCC, nos. 665-667)

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## **The Ascension**

The death of a member of his family or of a loved friend, must be the saddest event imaginable in the life of an atheist. He is one who really is convinced that there is no God, no future life and therefore that the relative or friend is to turn into dust in the grave, never to be met with again. The thought that every day that passes is bringing him too nearer to that same sad fate, death, which will be the end of all his ambitions, all his enjoyments, the end of everything he thought he was or had, must be something hard to live with.

Thank God, we have the good fortune to know, and reason and faith convince us of this truth, that death is not the end of man. It is rather the real beginning. Today's feast—the Ascension of our Lord in his human nature—to his Father's and our Father's home, is the confirmation and the guarantee of this doctrine of our faith. We shall all rise from the grave with new, glorified bodies and ascend to heaven, as Christ did. There we'll begin our true life of eternal happiness.

While it is true that even for good Christians the death of a beloved one is a cause of sorrow and tears, this is natural as we still are of the earth earthly. Yet the certitude that our beloved one has gone to his true life and will be there to meet us when our turn comes, is always at the back of our minds to console and comfort us. What all human beings want is to live on forever with our dear ones. Death breaks that continuity but only for a little while. That break is necessary for the new life to begin.

It is only in heaven that this natural desire of an unending life with all those we love can be realized and death on earth is the door to that eternal life.

Look up to heaven today. See Christ ascending to his Father and our Father. Say: Thank you, God, for creating me, and for giving me, through the Incarnation of your beloved Son, the possibility and the assurance that if I do my part here, when death comes it will not be an enemy but a friend, to speed me on my way to the true, supernatural life which you have, in your love, planned and prepared for me.



It was written, and foretold, that Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory. The servant is not above the Master. I too must suffer. I too must accept the hardships and the trials of this life, if I want, and I do, to enter into the life of glory. Christ, who was sinless, suffered hardship and pain. I have earned many, if not all of my hardships, by my own sins. I should be glad of the opportunity to make some

atonement for my past offenses, by willingly accepting the crosses he sends me. These crosses are signs of God's interest in my true welfare. Through him he is giving me a chance to prepare myself for the day of reckoning, for the moment of my death which will decide my eternal future. For every prayer I say for success in life, I should say three for a successful death, a death free from sin and at peace with God.

## The Meaning of the Ascension Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI

What is the meaning of Christ's "ascension into heaven"?

It expresses our belief that in Christ human nature, the humanity in which we all share, has entered into the inner life of God in a new and hitherto unheard of way. It means that man has found an everlasting place in God.

Heaven is not a place beyond the stars, but something much greater, something that requires far more audacity to assert: Heaven means that man now has a place in God. The basis for this assertion is the interpenetration of humanity and divinity in the crucified and exalted man Jesus. Christ, the man who is in God and eternally one with God, is at the same time God's abiding openness to all human beings.

Thus Jesus himself is what we call "heaven"; heaven is not a place but a person, the person of him in whom God and man are forever and inseparably one. And we go to heaven and enter into heaven to the extent that we go to Jesus Christ and enter into him. In this sense, "ascension into heaven" can be something that takes place in our everyday lives...

For the disciples, the "ascension" was not what we usually misinterpret it as being: the temporary absence of Christ from the world. It meant rather his new, definitive, and irrevocable presence by participation in God's royal power... God has a place for man! ... In God there is a place for us!" Be consoled, flesh and blood, for in Christ you have taken possession of heaven and of God's kingdom!" (Tertullian).

#### BAPTISMS

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:45 pm (immediately following 11:30 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office no later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

#### WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.
