#### BAPTISMS

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either during a weekend Mass or on the third Sunday of the month at 12:30 pm (immediately following 11:15 am Mass). Parents must attend a Baptism Preparation class prior to the Baptism. Classes are held in the Parish Center at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month. Please call the Parish Center for more information.

Required paperwork MUST be submitted to the parish office **no** later than ten (10) business days prior to the baptismal date or your date will be rescheduled. This includes all necessary information regarding family records and godparents. Please read the baptism planning information provided before selecting a godparent. A sponsor certificate must be provided by each godparent. The proper sponsor certificate for St. Peter the Apostle is included with the baptism packet. Christian witnesses are most welcome to celebrate with the family and community, but please note they are not recorded as sponsors on the Baptismal Certificate or in the Baptismal Register.

#### THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK

If you or someone you know is in need of this Sacrament, please contact the Parish Center at any time. Upon admission to the hospital, please make it known you are a member of St. Peter the Apostle Catholic Church.

#### WEDDINGS

According to diocesan policy, the parish must be contacted six months prior to the intended wedding date. Please call the Parish Center (ext. 201) for information.

#### IF YOU ARE HOSPITALIZED...

If you or a family member are admitted to the hospital, please contact the Parish Center to let us know. Due to federal regulations, most hospitals will not contact parishes unless you specifically request it. We want to visit parishioners in the hospital, but are often unaware of their hospitalization.

# From the Pastor

This Wednesday we begin Lent. Ash Wednesday is one of the most popular days of the year among Catholics. Having been at three parishes, it was a common remark among the priests that on Ash Wednesday, people would like there to be a drive through for them to receive their ashes. They were more concerned about the outward sign of their ashes than the attendance at holy mass.

Ashes are a symbol. We shouldn't receive ashes just for the sake of people being able to see us walk around with ashes on our foreheads. If we do, we run the risk of doing exactly what Jesus warn us about in the gospel; "take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them". Rather, what is most important is the kind of decisions we make in what we will do to become closer to Jesus during this Lenten season. We need to change what is inside of us which will be reflected on our outsides. We need to pray as to how we can become the very image of Jesus Christ, himself.

Many people during Lent ask for dispensations for one reason or another. Rather than looking for a dispensation, it would be better to show others the sacrifice we are willing to do out of love and respect of Our Lord. Jesus died for love of us on the cross; we need to ask ourselves how we can die for love of Him.

Of course, we are not going to be able to make these sacrifices and changes on our own. We need to pray for the grace and ask Jesus how we can accomplish them, knowing He will help because He has put the inspirations in our hearts. We also know we are strengthened by the reception of frequent confession and holy communion.

This Lent with so many Christians suffering throughout the world, let us join our sufferings and sacrifices to theirs. Let us place them on the paten at each holy mass. In this way, we will not only grow in Jesus' likeness but help to make the world a better place for all to live.

#### LENTEN REGULATIONS

Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to **abstain from meat** on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is **bound to fast** on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

On these two days of fast and abstinence, **only one full meatless meal is allowed**. Two other **meatless** meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected the law does not apply. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

Lent is the principal season of penance in the Christian year. All of the faithful are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial (in addition to following the Lenten regulations), serious prayer and a performance of works of charity and mercy.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All Catholics who have reached age 18 and are not yet 60 are required to fast on these days. All Catholics who are age 14 and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

Fast and Abstinence Requirements for Ash Wednesday and Good Friday

- Eat only one regular size meal.
- Eat two smaller meals (or less) that do not equal your main meal.
  - Do not eat or snack between meals.
  - Do not eat any meat, soup made with meat, gravy, broth, or any other dish prepared with meat.

#### **13 DAY PILGRIMAGE TO SPAIN & PORTUGAL** VIA THE WAY OF ST. JAMES May 10 - May 22, 2015 WITH FR. SLAWEK IGNASIK OF ST. PETER THE APOSTLE PARISH, ITASCA

Day 1 - Depart Chicago O'Hare Airport.

Day 2 - Upon arrival in Barcelona we will meet our tour guide and begin a city tour by bus of the "second capital of Spain". We will see properties built by renowned architect Antoni Guadi (1852-1926) including the Casa Mila, Casa Battlo, and Montanera. We will visit the still incomplete basilica of Sagrada Familia with a projected completion in 2026. It will have 18 towers: 12 dedicated to the apostles, 4 to the evangelists, one to Jesus and another to Mary. We will drive through Park Guel and stop at the Hill of Montijuic for a beautiful panorama view of the city. Dinner and overnight in Barcelona.

Day 3 - After breakfast, we continue our tour of Barcelona with a walk through Barrio Gotico (the old town) to visit the Cathedral of St. Eulalia, the Jewish quarter, St. Mark's Square and the church of Santa Maria del Mar. In the afternoon we will visit La Rambla Street with its colorful markets and enjoy a cruise around the Barcelona's harbor. Dinner and Flamenco show. Overnight at hotel.

Day 4 - After breakfast we transfer to Montserrat and the beginning of our pilgrimage route to Santiago de Compostella via the Calatan Camino also referred to as the Ignatius Way. We will visit the dramatic Benedictine monastery and home of the Shrine of Our Lady of Montserrat. According to Catholic tradition the statue was carved by St. Luke around 50 AD and brought to Spain. We will then travel on the camino to Manresa where St. Ignatius travelled by foot from Montserrat which inspired "The book of the Spiritual Exercises". We will continue along the carnino to Zaragoza for dinner and overnight at hotel.

Day 5 - After breakfast ,we will visit Zaragoza city, the magnificent Basilica del Pilar, where the Blessed Mother appeared to St. James. We will also visit the Cathedral of Zaragoza and have a walking tour of the city. Afterwards we will transfer to Pamplona, famous Day 7 - After breakfast we will continue along the worldwide for the running of the bulls during the San Fermín festival. We will visit the Cathedral of Santa Maria Diocesan Museum, occupying the former refectory, chapter house and convent kitchen. The nearly 100 well preserved medieval stained glass museum's collection includes relics of the Lignum Crucis and the Holy Sepulchre, both in gilded silver and enamel from the 13th and 14th centuries. Afterwards we will transfer to the Basque Country and San Sebastian (Donostia) which is a part of the Northern Route to Compostella. Dinner and overnight at San Sebastian.

Day 6 - After breakfast we will visit the coastal city of San Sebastian situated on the Bay of Biscay and 20 km (12 miles) from the French border. It was a favorite resting place of Queen Isabella II. One of the most beautiful cities around the Camino, it is the beginning of the Northern Route and built around the bay - La mancha (shell). Walk through the city including; the town hall, Boulevard, Basilica of Saint Mary of the Chorus, San Sebastián's Cathedral, and Maria Cristina Bridge. After a short leisure time, we will leave the Northern Route of the Camino and transfer to Burgos, located on the French Way (Camino Francés), to visit Burgos Cathedral, one of the three largest cathedrals in Spain and part of the UNESCO Word Heritage sites. Afterwards we will visit the ruins of the fortness Castillo de Santa Cruz de la Mota at the top of Urgull hill. Dinner & overnight at hotel in Burgos.

French Way and depart for Leon. We will visit the Cathedral de Leon, another example of Gothic architecture with a delicate, French Gothic style, with windows. Walk through the old city as we continue along the camino by visiting the new Episcopal Palace, the most popular place in Astorga. It was built between 1889 and 1913 when the original was destroyed by a fire. Bishop Grau decided to assign the design of the new building to his friend Antoni Gaudí. Transfer for dinner and overnight at hotel in Astorga.

Day 8 - After breakfast, we will continue our drive of the camino to Santiago de Compostela. Many make this pilgrimage as a form of spiritual path or retreat, for their spiritual growth. The Way of St. James was one of the most important Christian pilgrimages during the Middle Ages; together with Rome and Jerusalem, a plenary indulgence could be earned. In 1985 the city's Old Town was designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Spending the day in Santiago de Compostela, we will see the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, a place of pilgrimage since the Early Middle Ages. The building is a Romanesque structure with later Gothic and Baroque additions. Mass and time for private prayer. Dinner and accommodation at hotel in Satiago de Compostella.

Day 9 - After breakfast, time for indivdual prayer and leisure before departing Santiago de Compostella, for Porto. Transfer to Porto for a short walk through the city and dinner with local wine tasting. Porto wine, is a Portuguese fortified wine produced exclusively in the Douro Valley in the northern provinces of Portugal. Dinner and accommodation at hotel in Porto.

Day 10 - After breakfast we transfer to Coimbra, the former capital city of Portugal. We will visit Coimbra Old Cathedral (Se Velha de Coimbra) and the cloister, Monastery of Santa Clara-a-Velha. Visit the Carmelite convent where Sr. Lucia lived and died. As we leave Coimbra for Fatima, we will visit Aljustrel, where the three Little Shepherds were born, and the Sanctuary. Mass, time for prayer and walk through the sanctuary. Following dinner at the hotel, we will participate in the rosary at the Chapel of the Apparitions and candlelight procession. Dinner & overnight at hotel in Fatima.

Day 11 - After breakfast at the hotel, time for private praver and leisure. Dinner and overnight at hotel Fatima.

Day 12 - After breakfast, before making our way to the airport we will tour the city of St. Anthony - Lisbon. We will visit St. Anthony Church (the birthplace of St. Anthony of Padua), the Lisbon Cathedral, St. Roch Church, and Lookout Miradouro Sao Pedro de Alcantara for one of the best views in Lisbon. Walk through the old town. Dinner in Lisbon. Transfer to airport for flight to Madrid. Overnight in Madrid.

Day 13 - Transfer to Madrid airport for flight back to Chicago.
